What if the promises are forgotten or broken, as the govern-ment's promise to amend the charter was broken within a week? What will the government do in such a case? Will the government carry out its econd promise and take the matter nto its "most careful consideration" Possibly! But what good will that do? How will the government compel the exchange to carry out the promises of the two members of the exchange?


