Editor World: I have read Mr. Adam Hood's letter re a farmer being only paid 66 cents for wheat testing 53 lbs., while 60 lbs. standard wheat was worth 86 cents. Now, while I have no interest, directly or indirectly, in the Toronto wheat market, it is wel for the public to know (since this matter is being ventilated in the newspapers) that unfortunately Ontario in some parts had a wet harvest (Toronto being mecentre where wheat was the most sprouted by wet weather of any part of Ontario, and wheat sufficiently sprouted to test less than 56 and 57 lbs. to the measured busheh has lost its bread-making qualities, and can only be used for other purposes, and the tester (stamped by the Government's officer) is the best test available to ascertain how much bread-making properties the sprout has extracted from the grain. As a further test to ascertain how much sprouted wheat is unfit for bread, I had some loaves baked from flour made from sprouted wheat (testing about 53 lbs. to the measured bushel), and the bread would not bake, and was unfit for human food, and it would be well when such complaints are made to the press to ask complainer was your wheat sprouted.

London, Sept. 19 .- Prof. John Milne furnishes wonderful proof of the exact reliability of the earthquake-recording apparatus, even when almost the diameter of the globe from the scene of disturbance. He writes: "While at the British Association meeting in Toronto I exhibited a seismogram which had been forwarded from my station on the Isle of Wight. This was the record of a large earthquake, the duration of which had been three hours. 
