Rev. Mr. Maxwell (B.C.) raised his voice on the matter. He seven years of missionary work in the present afflicted districts of India gave him authority. He declared all contributions of grain to be useless. The only way to send help was by means of a draft on Bombay, with which grain could be bought and forwarded. This should be done at once.

Mr. Fielding reiterated the statement that the matter was under Governmental consideration and had formed a subject of correspondence with the Imperial authorities. If any citizens wished to contribute to the relief of the famine, they could send their contributions in money alone to a Mr. Courtney, Deputy Minister of Finance, who would see they were properly and promptly despatched. Mr. Courtney had been the treasurer of the India Famine Fund that existed years ago, and he had been in the famine-stricken area in favor of Governmental aid, as had been done before.

**Imperial Commissioners.** The incident dropped, and Mr. Charles asked the Premier for all correspondence regarding the offer of Imperial contributions to Canada.

HER MAJESTY SENT A WREATH

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach Spoke on Political Topics, Including Elections and the War.

London, April 19.—Primrose Day (the anniversary of the death of Lord Beaconsfield—Benjamin Disraeli) was observed throughout the country to-day with customary zeal. Primrose were planted everywhere, and the Beaconsfield statue was elaborately decorated.

Queen Victoria sent a massive wreath of primroses to Lord Beaconsfield's grave at Highgate.

No Date Set For General Election.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, replying to the toast of the Government at the Primrose Day banquet at Bristol, said he could not tell a general election would be held, and he was quite certain that nobody else knew, but if the Government were to be held to the natural life of Parliament, the Government would not stand in the circumstances until it was in a position to know the policy which it would recommend.

As to Imperial Federation.

"Lord Beaconsfield," continued the speaker, "was one of the first to appreciate the value of the Empire, and it is a delightful dream, and it may become a reality, but it is not a dream that can be forced upon the colonies. The colonies, however, have given an earnest of a future time when they may be some form of common organization for themselves and the Motherland, which might control the Imperial policy of the colonies an adequate share in the responsibilities and defence of the Empire."

As to the War Results.

"As to what the results of the war will be to South Africa, none can say, but the war has been a great success for the Empire and the world. Let Great Britain and the Empire be ever united and see to it that when the war is over, it is never, if we can help it, occur again."

Over 200 were present, and the session continued until nearly midnight.

MR. CURRY OUGHT TO RESIGN

He Cannot Act for the People and the Toronto Railway at the Same Time.

Crown Attorney Curry came out in the House yesterday, and professionally and professedly represented the Street Railway Company before the subcommittee appointed to look after the penalty clauses in the Toronto bill, some of which were proposed with matters that necessarily be considered by Mr. Curry in his official capacity of Crown Attorney, which supports him to stand between the citizens of Toronto and the Street Railway Company.

ONTARIO GRAFTERS AGAIN

W. T. R. Preston and Inspector Chamberlain Got Brick From Central Prison.

Inspector Nixon testified before the Public Accounts Committee yesterday that W. T. R. Preston, ex-librarian, and now Dominion Superintendent of Immigration Offices in England, owes the Central Prison \$144 for bricks since 1891. George Wheeler of the Registrar-General's office is similarly indebted to the tune of \$983 since 1888, and Inspector Chamberlain owes \$154 since 1888 for a carpet bought in 1886. Warden Massey owes \$81. Inspector Nixon cannot collect.

"Cap" Sullivan, according to the accounts of Auditor Sproule, was paid \$5 a day for 725 days, including Sundays, for his services in the exportation of logs, and George Lawrence of Oshawa for like work got \$2 a day.

Toronto Again Thrown Down.

Mr. Boy's bill for the city of Toronto was taken up by the Municipal Committee yesterday. The clauses enabling the municipality to purchase and develop land as manufacturing electrical energy, light, heat, gas, and to exempt Toronto from the provisions of the Connet Act, were thrown out.

By a majority of one the committee threw out the proposal to compel a gas or water works to supply any citizen along the line of supply.
