Missouri and Kansas both report crop rather backward and as usual the trade must look forward to more or less crop scares in July and August. The fact that these are very possible will make it good policy to buy September corn on any further decline, as the sellers will prohably cause a good many advances from time to time. The export demand is very small.


