## THIRTY-SEVEN WERE DROWNED

When the Clan Drummond Sank in the Bay of Biscay.

Lisbon, Dec. 2.—Thirty-seven people, who were on board the British steamer Clan Drummond, from the Clyde, via Liverpool, for Cape Verde, were previously reported totally wrecked in the Bay of Biscay, were drowned.

## The Ontario Mutual Life.

How the West Elgin Election Was Voided—Justice Aided by the Numbered Ballot.

[St. Thomas Journal.]

The West Elgin case was called at 10:30 at the election court this morning. The East Elgin case was postponed for the time. Mr. Aylesworth appeared with Mr. J. M. Glenn for the petitioner, Wm. E. Howarth, and Mr. Nesbitt appeared with Mr. T. W. Crothers for the respondent, Findlay & McDiarmid.

Charge No. 47 was first taken up. It alleged John Taylor voted without a right to vote. He was not the man entered on the list. He thought he had a vote on polling day. He had never voted before because he had never had a vote. He was a bricklayer and plasterer. John Taylor was entered on the list simply as tenant, and took the oath thinking he was the man intended. He lived on the south side of Talbot street and he understood the other John Taylor lived on the north side. Their places of residence were about half a mile apart.

John Taylor, the white man, was next called. He lived at 22 Talbot street on election day. He knew there was another John Taylor who was on the poll on election day and found that another man had voted on his ballot.

The poll book No. 1, poll st. Thomas, was produced, and it was found that John Taylor had voted.

Upon a scrutiny of the ballots it was found that John Taylor's ballot was 6223 and that he voted for McDiarmid. Mr. Aylesworth said that if this vote were deducted from the votes cast for the respondent it left the vote a tie.

Justice Osler said in that case the returning officer could not now step in, there would have to be a new election.

Mr. Nesbitt said he had no evidence to offer on the cross-petition, and this ended the case.

## SURPRISED THE BOARD.

Coburg Puts in a Bill of \$14,005—For a Case of Smallpox—Effects of Bad Well Water.

Toronto, Dec. 2.—The town of Coburg charged the Ontario Government \$14,005 for providing care, comfort and medical attendance for the lady who landed there from Rochester suffering from smallpox. The members present at the provincial board of health meeting expressed considerable surprise at the size of the bill. It included vaccine and vaccination of the town of Coburg and the surroundings, and the attendance of the physician who had devoted his exclusive attention to the patient.

Mr. J. J. McKinnon read a report on the epidemic of typhoid in Hamilton township, Northumberland county. A detailed account of the cases and order of their occurrence was given.

It was pointed out that there seemed every reason to believe that one polluted well was responsible for the majority of the cases. There were in all 21 cases, with one death.

The report of Dr. McEachern concerning hog cholera near Ottawa was also read.

Diphtheria was reported from Oro, Simcoe county, and Euphemia, Lambton county.

It was moved by Dr. Cassidy and seconded by Dr. Bryce, that if the opinion of the board it should be made obligatory on physicians to report all cases of tuberculosis occurring in their practice. If a physician is not consulted then this duty should fall upon the household; that local health boards should provide for the regular and systematic disinfection of the domicile in which the patient lives, and that the health department should be notified of the removal of all tubercular cases to an hospital or a sanatorium. The resolution was adopted.

## BLOCKING THE WHEELS

Of Judicial Reform in the Operation of Courts-Martial.

The Vote in the French Senate on Abolition of Secret Examinations.

Duplicate in China of the Pashoda Case—The Kaiser at Home—Big Harvest in New South Wales.

Paris, Dec. 2.—The senate yesterday adopted a motion placing court-martials under the operation of the law of 1897, which abolishes the secret examination of accused persons prior to the trial. An amendment proposing to retain secret examination in cases involving national danger was opposed by the minister of war, M. De Freycinet, and rejected. M. Waldeck-Rousseau demanded urgency for a proposal to empower the court of cassation to order the stay of any prosecution calculated to hamper a revision case. One hundred and thirteen voted for and one hundred and thirteen against the motion for urgency, which was, therefore, lost. The tie voting results in the measure being referred to a special committee, so that it cannot be passed soon enough to apply to the Piquart case. Legal opinion leads to the view that M. Dupuy, the premier, was told that the colonel was not a member of the court of cassation, but that the court of cassation had power to delay the Piquart court-martial and it was on the theory that the minister had no right to refuse to see friends. It is alleged the military authorities are doing their best to keep Piquart from view. It is also alleged that the minister of war, M. De Freycinet, is in the Chamber of Deputies, will shortly interpellate the government as to the unsatisfactory manner in which the case is being handled by the military authorities.

The Paris correspondent of the London Daily News, Emily Crawford, predicts that the court of cassation will declare the Dreyfus trial irregular and Dreyfus innocent. In her opinion, the court will not interfere in the Piquart case.

## FASHODA REPEATED

Shanghai, Dec. 2.—The negotiations in progress at Nanking between the French consul at Shanghai and Liou Yoon Yui, Viceroy of Nanking, in regard to the French administration of the province, have reached a stage. The French administration of the province, which is expected to arrive at Nanking on Friday to watch proceedings. The action of the French in the Yangtze River Valley indicates a disposition on the part of France to interfere with British interests there. The situation bears a strong resemblance to the Fashoda affair.
