

DILLON, NATIONALIST CHIEF, REPUDIATES THE SINN FEINERS

Declares His Faith in Goodwill of Britain.

DUBLIN, May 21.—John Dillon, the Nationalist leader, in an interview with the Associated Press correspondent today, emphasized the divergence between his party and the Sinn Fein, whose policy he declared to be "wrong and foolish and bound to end in disaster."

Mr. Dillon said he still believed in a friendly settlement with Great Britain. He adhered to the declaration of the late John E. Redmond, made at the outbreak of the war, that the "cause of the Allies is the cause of freedom."

In an appeal to the American people, Mr. Dillon said the Sinn Fein had been supplied with unlimited financial resources from New York, and he urged that all those of Irish blood in the United States to support his party against the Sinn Fein.

Turks In Mutiny and Forces Sent To Scene Desert

ATHENS, May 21.—Turkish troops at Aidin, in Asia Minor, have mutinied. Two thousand soldiers sent from Manissa, 20 miles northeast of Smyrna, to quell the disturbances, have deserted.

Numerous desertions also are reported from the coast garrisons. Repression of the movement has been entrusted to Esad Pasha of Janina.

CIVIL SERVANTS WHO SAW ACTIVE SERVICE MAY GET SALARIES

Government Modifies Recent Order-in-Council.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA, May 21.—It is understood that the Government has provided for the modification of an order-in-council recently passed which revoked an important provision made in the early days of the war affecting civil servants who enlisted for service. It was then provided that civil servants who joined the colors should continue to draw their salaries as civil servants in addition to the army pay. Later this was modified, and they were permitted to choose which way they preferred. This latter modification, however, was not retroactive.

More recently another order was passed, completely wiping out the under-standings above-mentioned, and providing that in future civil service pay would be stopped in the case of men on service on the right side, and not affect men who have seen or are now on active service in France.

FORMER LONDON MAN KILLED AT CHATHAM

William Somers Electrocuted in Hydro-Electric Station.

CHATHAM, May 21.—William Somers, for many years an electrical contractor in London, but for some time past in the employ of the local hydro commission, was instantly killed today when 26,000 volts passed through his body at the moment when he was at work on a "dead" switch, and in some unexplained manner came in contact with a "live" line. The current entered at the top of the head and came out just below the ribs on the right side, and the victim was badly burned.

He was well known as an electrical expert, and came to Chatham soon after hydro was first installed. He was local inspector of wiring for a time, and later left the city, returning again in the employ of the Ontario commission in charge of maintenance of certain parts of station equipment in the district. He came here from Petrolia. His wife and eight children survive. An inquest was commenced tonight by Coroner Bray, and after viewing the remains the jury adjourned until Monday evening.

Following the accident every effort was made to resuscitate Somers, and for two hours physicians worked with the pulmotor and oxygen.

MOSTLY EXTINGUISHED.

GUTHRIE, N. S., May 21.—Most of the forest fires in this county have now been extinguished. The most destructive blaze was at Reachville, near here, where large areas of timber were destroyed.

GIRL COLLAPSES WHEN SENTENCED FOR DEATH OF HER INFANT CHILD

TORONTO, May 21.—After four hours' deliberation today, the jury at the assizes, before Justice Middleton, returned a verdict of guilty of manslaughter, in the case of Beatrice Dessol, and not guilty in the case of her twin brother, Morris Dessol, of the charge of murdering the infant child of Beatrice Dessol, whose body was found wrapped in a blanket on an embankment near the Lambton Golf Club, on March 29 last. In sentencing Beatrice Dessol to five years in the penitentiary, his lordship advised her counsel, T. C. Robbette, K.C., to apply to the department of justice for leniency.

A dramatic incident marked the pronouncing of the sentence. The prisoner, who was a highly nervous state, uttered a loud shriek, and collapsed on the floor. She had to receive attention, and it was some time before she was able to be removed.

TWO THOUSAND BOYS NEEDED TO PULL FLAX

TORONTO, May 21.—Teen age boys of Western Ontario are being counted on to pull the flax crop this season. All the other help available will be used, but the flax growers realize that they will need about 2,000 boys if the crop is to be harvested.

About 16,000 acres of flax are being cultivated this season. This is the acreage of last year, and three times as much was planted in 1914. The flax is growing well in Western Ontario, west of Guelph.

During the last two days meetings have been held at the Parliament Buildings of the Canadian Flax Growers' Association, to discuss the labor situation. The association, superintendent of the trades and labor branch of the government, and the growers, who will have charge of the campaign to secure the necessary boys.

Five farmers were granted exemption by Tribunal No. 139, sitting at Chatham. Five others were refused.

Red Cross workers of Sarnia, who are to provide the luncheon when the Duke of Devonshire and party pay the official visit there on June 7, have announced that the meal will be strictly in accordance with the food regulations.

The average sale price for helleys was \$740, and for bulls \$1,258 at the Watt-Gardhouse sale in Guelph yesterday. The proceeds of the sale of 51 animals was \$47,250.

Brantford city council has endorsed the move of the Toronto council calling for the abolition of the Canadian Senate.

William Smith, 272 Dundas street, Sarnia, had his eight fingers severed at the middle joint while working on a press at the Perfection Stove Works.

The Lutheran League of Canada, organized ten years ago, will hold its annual convention at Galt May 24-25.

Flight Lieut. George Hawkins, a well-known young Brantford officer, has been accidentally killed while flying in England.

Mail delivery for Woodstock city has been officially sanctioned, according to orders received at the postoffice there. Many attempts have been made in the past to get this service.

Galt's Overseas Y. M. C. A. donations total \$12,550.55. The objective was \$12,000.

Quarantine regulations are being strictly enforced, say Sarnia health officials, in connection with the outbreak of smallpox there.

Tiltsburg and surrounding small towns and villages have been struck by a real gasoline famine, which will last until another tank car arrives.

Fort Hill Methodist Church has extended an invitation to Rev. R. T. Zimmerman of Kelvin.

(Major) Alex. McKay, the new inspector of prisoners and charities, is speaking to the graduates of the Kitchen-Waterloo Hospital, at the graduation exercises last night, paid tribute to the hospital there.

LOBO, May 21.—The young people of Lobo Township have completed arrangements for a monster picnic to be held May 24 at the petrifying springs. The outing promises to be one of the most successful affairs in the history of the township.

Crop conditions are reported most favorable all through the district. The warm weather induced rapid growth. There is an abundance of blossoms on the fruit trees. More rain is needed in some sections.

The old Komoka butter factory was completely destroyed by fire on Friday evening.

A.—James Gray, local representative of the publicly department of the Canada food board, reports that there are no regulations issued as yet concerning the holding of wheat by farmers. On his advice, it would be wise for you to write the Canada food board, Ottawa, for a ruling on the matter.

HENSALL, Q.—Where a merchant has tobacco, cigars and matches in stock and raises the price to cover the war tax, does he have to put on government stamps, or how does the Government collect the war tax on these goods?

A.—Matches are the only goods mentioned in the act.
