WESTERN'S RECORD NEVER EQUALLED BY OTHER SCHOOLS

Ten Out of Eleven Candidates Pass License.

An unprecedented record has been set up by the graduates of the Western University Medical School, according to the results of the recent examination for licenses under the Ontario Medical Council issued on Wednesday, which show that ten out of eleven who wrote have passed.

Such an enviable record has never been attained by a medical school at this examination of the faculty, graduates and undergraduates of Western are expressing the greatest pride in the achievement of the graduates this year. The one member of the class who failed did so in only one subject.

"It simply goes to show that the training received at Western here is second to none in the province," declared a prominent medical man to The Advertiser. "This is the only examination at which graduates of the medical schools in the province meet and take a common examination test, and it thus affords excellent opportunity for comparison. That the Western graduates made such a record speaks well for the training provided at Western."

Only graduates holding the degree of M.D. are admitted to the examination. The following Western graduates have passed and will receive licenses to practice in Ontario: Drs. E. J. G. Seaton, J. F. Weir and A. Shiell.

Stanley Morton, an Anglican clergyman from Toronto, has reported for duty, and Lieut.-Col. Ennis, from Toronto, is expected to arrive in a few days. The latter will be senior chaplain of Military District No. 1. He has seen service overseas, and is a Methodist.

Capt. Graham, who was camp chaplain here for several months, is now in Winnipeg, where he will act as senior chaplain for Military District No. 10, with the rank of Major.

WALPER HOUSE MAY BE NEW HOME OF THE WAR VETERANS

Soldiers Ask Council's Help in Financing Proposition.

PATRIOTIC FUND SCORED

Alleged That Many Families Are Being Neglected at Present.

The Great War Veterans' new home will be located in the Walper House.

Capt. McDonald and Sergt. Pocock appeared before the finance committee of the city council Wednesday night and asked for some assistance in helping the G. W. V. A. handle the proposition. They asked a remission of the taxes and a grant to take care of the water and electric light charges.

The officers stated that they intended to take on the place as a veterans' home. They would keep the standard of care here and have to stay over night also for the children and wives of soldiers who are neglected by the Government. This brought out some interesting remarks about the patriotic fund. Ald. S. B. Manneke asked to know if the Government did not take care of all soldiers' families. What did the patriotic fund do? he asked. The mayor said he understood that it was compulsory for the patriotic fund to care for all.

Alleges Neglect.

Sergt. Pocock said that nevertheless the fund neglected many. He said the veterans could cite hundreds of cases. There are many, he said, in London who are going without the benefits of the fund rather than go to the local office and accept the abuse they are all subject to at the hands of the woman in charge of the office.

Mayor Somerville said that he had heard reports; he just wanted other views.

Controller Merryfield said that he knew of a large number of cases of men of the 13th Battalion who were getting absolutely no assistance.

The council agreed to assist the G. W. V. A. to the extent asked.

The veterans are taking an eight-year lease on the hotel.

Will Lease Garage.

The committee agreed to accept a two-year lease for the Reliance garage, a part of the federal square site, at \$125 a month, and will spend \$250 in repairing the roof. Ald. Manneke pointed out that the building cost the city \$1,125, so that an income of \$1,500 a year was pretty fair profits.

Messrs. Dale and Seronoff, city auditors, appeared on the corner. Their inquirer, Ald. H. J. Ashplant, was not present.

"What's the crime?" asked the mayor. The auditors reported that everything was well forward. The L. P. S. Railway audit, they said, was up to April, the closest they could get. In other departments they were a little behind, but this was due to changing staffs and work not being done. The report was considered satisfactory and the auditors were "shooed out" before Ald. Ashplant arrived.

The committee paid a rather doubtful compliment to Ald. H. B. Ashplant, who was named some time ago to see the city solicitor re the removal of the fire alarm wires from Bell Telephone on Richmond street north, when it named Chairman Harley a committee of one to do the job.

Mayor Somerville made a most unkind touch when he said, referring to Ald. Ashplant, "I don't think if we appointed Ald. Ashplant for that work it will never be done."

Up to the Chairman.

Mayor Somerville then suggested that the chairman see the solicitor. He will do so.

Hon. T. W. Crothers, Canada's minister of labor, is very anxious to comply with London's request that License Inspector McCallum be appointed an inspector of cold storage.

has only asked about a dozen times since it has been a tedious job to wake the sleeping minister up. "Try, try again, and you will succeed at last." Will Help in Work.

The school board has billed the city for \$441 for the use of school rooms for the election. This is the rate of \$7 per room. City Clerk Baker said his agreement was that the city should pay the janitors and for light. He had done so and the cost had been apportioned. The clerk will report later.
