FLOOD CONDITIONS CAUSE OF DAMAGES TO RETAINING WALL

Thames Overflows New Park At Ingersoll—River Near High Water Mark.

INGERSOLL, March 12 .- But for the drop in the temperature tonight flood conditions might have been serious. The Thames rose rapidly today, and tonight is close to the high-water mark. It has been fed by scores of tributaries draining all sections of the surrouncing districts, and had there been the usual tectors review difficulties. the usual ice floes, serious difficulty might have occurred at the bridges in the town. In some quarters of the town the freshet has been viewed with uneasiness. Many cellars have been flooded, and in some instances the warter in them is four feet deep. 

OTTAWA, March 12.—(By Canadian Press).—In answer to questions of C. A. Fournier (Bellechasse) in the House, the minister of agriculture explains that the embargo on Canadian cattle exported to Great Britain was placed by the United Kingdom in 1896 on any cattle entering that country except for immediate slaughter.

The Canadian livestock commission had made representations to the British Government in 1919 for the removal of the restrictions as they apply to Canadian cattle.
