

He denounced the British preference as one-sided and stated that Canada would never consent to the continu-ance of a policy that was of so little advantage to the people of this coun-try. What was necessary was mutual preference within the great empire. Hon. J. Douglas Hazen followed in one of the very best speeches of the evening. The audience was delighted with the eloquent prime minister of New Brunswick. His description of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's attempts to reform the Liberal party from within by tak-ing the Hon. William Pugsley to his arms elicited applause. His repetition of his challenge to Dr. Pugsley was effective and at times dramatic. Hon. Premier Roblin also spoke. He
