It was agreed that the Resolution of May 17, 1867, relative to £40 stg. from the Block Sum to Pugwash should be acted upon.

NOVEMBER 15, 1867.—A letter from the Solicitor of the Estate of the late Rev. T. C. Leaver was submitted, stating that the balance of the Legacy in favor of Truro would shortly be paid to the Society, and that the annual interest of the reversion of a Legacy in favor of the Society would in future be at its disposal.

DECEMBER 20, 1867.—An application was presented for leave to draw the grant for a missionary without the fulfillment of the conditions. It was *Resolved*, "That in future similar requests must be accompanied by an application to the same effect from the Wardens and Vestry, shewing the causes which have prevented the people from fulfilling their engagements."

FEBRUARY 21, 1868.—An application for aid to the missionary at Newport was referred to the Committee on Salaries.
