They were last in the fog off the Grand Banks, and were picked up by the Russian bark "Thoren" last Tuesday.

Leonard Jewett, American vice-consul, has received word from Mrs. E. Myers, late American consul of this city, that she has reached her native home at Pelee, Indiana. The consul has been treated for a tumor on one of his eyes, and the pain that he suffered is much less, although the sight of the eye will never be recovered.
