

boarders. A spacious parlor and bedroom are allotted to each pair of students. The University organization dates from 1862.

2. The Mount Allison Ladies' College, founded in 1854. This flourishing institution has a teaching staff of seventeen employed in its different departments. It is so related to the University that its students can take advantage of the University classes for their advanced work, while it affords a pleasant home for young ladies pursuing a regular Undergraduate course in the University. In 1890 the Department of Music was developed into a regular Conservatory of Music, employing six teachers, and a commodious building was erected especially for its use. During the year 1893 a collection of pictures, valued at \$50,000, known as "The Owen's Art Gallery," has been transferred to the College, and the Fine Arts Department has been placed under the direction of an R. C. A. of eminence, with two associate instructors. A new stone building, in which to house the collection, is now being erected at a cost of about \$25,000. This structure is 115 x 65 feet, and consists of three connected galleries and a suite of work rooms for the Art Classes.

3. The Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy. This institution, still in a flourishing condition, was founded in 1843, and was the gift to the Methodist Church of Charles F. Allison, Esq., who also contributed to the founding and maintenance of the University and Ladies' College by generous gifts and devises. The Semi-centennial or Jubilee of the institutions was celebrated with much enthusiasm in January, 1893. The Academy embraces, besides the ordinary outfit of such a school, a vigorous Commercial Department or College.
