THINKS HE HAS BEEN TAKEN TOO SERIOUSLY

Has No Sympathy With Relative's Radical Policies

LIKES LIMELIGHT

Not Much Attention Was Paid To His Words Three Years Ago

SPECIAL TO THE TIMES-STAR. NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—"A destructive genius," is the term applied by P. D. Saklatvala, president of the Middle State Oil Corporation, at his office, 220 Broadway, yesterday, in referring to his brother, Shapurji Saklatvala, Communist member of the British Parliament, who cannot attend the inter-parliamentary union conference next month because Secretary of State Kellogg has shut the gates of the country against him.

Mr. Saklatvala has a natural affection for his brother in England but he himself has no sympathy whatsoever with his brother's radical political policies.

LIKES PUBLICITY. Almost from childhood, he said, his brother has always taken "the opposite side," to every question. "He likes publicity," said Mr. Saklatvala laughing. "I think he's been taken too seriously."

"What do you think of the action of Secretary Kellogg in barring him," he was asked.

"Well, it's an open question," he replied. "I guess the Government authorities know their business."

Asked if he considered that the British Government had instigated this country's action against his brother he replied:

"Of course, I know nothing about that. I don't suppose they would be pleased to have him come here."

UNNOTICED BEFORE. In expressing the opinion that his brother was being taken too seriously, Mr. Saklatvala pointed out that his brother three years ago attended the conference of the same inter-parliamentary union in Copenhagen. "I believe he spoke there, but nobody paid much attention to him."

DELEGATES SAIL. LONDON, Sept. 19.—The majority of the British delegates to the inter-parliamentary union in Ottawa and Washington, left today for Southampton to embark on the liner Coronia. The delegation includes more than 80 members.

COLLEGE TOUR OF WORLD IS DELAYED

Magnitude of Task Compels Sponsors to Postpone Trip For Time.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The "around the world college," a globe-circling educational tour in which 480 American college boys and 50 faculty members will participate, will not sail until October, 1926, it was announced at New York University, sponsors of the project.
