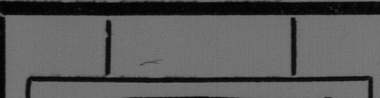
Diocesan Meeting Plans Are Discussed—Special Speakers During Winter.

BELGIAN CREDITS ARE ARRANGED FOR

Bankers of Many Lands Come to Aid of Franc-N. Y. is Interested.

Canadian Press. NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—London, Amsterdam, Swiss and New York bankers, have come to the support of the Belgian franc, which is shortly to return to the gold standard. Following conferences held in London, between Governor Hamilton, of the National Bank of Belgium, Finance Minister Janssen, of Belgium, and foreign bankers, it is understood credits have been arranged for.

Wall Street hears that J. P. Morgan and the Guaranty Trust Company will temporarily advance credits to Belgium which will later be repaid with a loan of from \$100,000,000 to \$150,000,000.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 20.—Twenty years can be added to the average life through hygiene, it was intimated at the American Public Health Association's 84th annual convention here. One way of improving health educational work is to train more efficient speakers, the convention was told.

Has \$35,000,000 To Invest in Canada

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 20.—Representing British capital approximately \$35,000,000, H. F. Tapscott, London, Eng., reached Winnipeg yesterday to study conditions in western Canada. To date, the interests Mr. Tapscott represents have invested \$25,000,000 in Canada, chiefly in Ontario and British Columbia.

Word That Conditions Between Here and St. Stephen Are Very Bad.

Residents along the coast between here and St. Stephen, The Times-Star is informed, are becoming indignant over the way that the section is being deluged with contraband liquor. One man said that conditions were terrible and appeared to be getting worse. Automatic Telephones Planned For Moscow

MOSCOW, Oct. 20.—Preliminary agreements have been concluded between the Soviet government and the Ericsson Telephone Company of Sweden for the construction of three modern automatic telephone systems in Moscow, and one at Rostov-on-Don. The cost will be \$2,500,000. The government itself will spend \$3,000,000 in the reconstruction and re-equipment of its present telephone system.
