HEALTH MANUAL FOR SCHOOLS

Distribution of Insulin Reported on at Health Bureau Meeting.

The New Brunswick Bureau of Health was in session here all day yesterday at the Health Centre with Dr. G. G. Melvin, chief medical health officer of the province, presiding. The quarterly session was not concluded until after midnight.

At the afternoon session Dr. Desmond reported that the smallpox in Westmorland had come from the Fraser Lumber Co. camp and recommended that the costs be fixed on the Fraser Company. He said that 820 people were vaccinated in Restigouche during this outbreak.

Dr. H. L. Abramson, reporting on the insulin clinics under the auspices of the Department of Health, said that up to the end of May 31,000 units of insulin had been distributed free, and since that time increasing amounts had been distributed.

He also reported on a new method of determining the disease. Reports were heard from H. D. Morris, of Chatham, secretary for Northumberland and Mrs. Wheeler, of Fredericton, secretary for York.

Miss H. McKeljohn, director of Public Health Nursing service, reported that conditions were much the same. There were no new nurses. St. Andrews had decided to affiliate with the Department of Health and to put a nurse's services at the disposal of the department for school purposes if a subsidy of \$100 was paid.

It was decided that the Department of Health undertake to gather material for the compilation of a health manual for schools.

Reports on Schools.
Dr. C. A. King, medical inspector of schools, reporting for Kings, Albert, Charlotte, except St. Stephen, and Queens, said that in 293 school districts, 9,066 were enrolled; 7,221 had been examined, 382 were found defective and 1,975 were vaccinated. Of the

defective 286 had been remedied. Three clinics were held in Kings county. Everything was in pretty good shape. Egan was eager for clinics. The great majority of the people were willing to pay something.

Dr. G. W. Bulley, Woodstock, reported that at McAdam the C. P. R. were going to build a subway to eliminate danger at the level crossing in the yards over which 1,600 people passed daily. The Hartland school he reported to be near completion. It had a room for medical inspection. McAdam had commenced a new school. Marysville had authority for a new school but had not started construction. He reported that there were some districts that were eager to have a doctor.

Dr. W. S. Loggie, Chatham, found 63 per cent of improvement in normals; 25 to 80 per cent of defectives remedied. In Moncton there was a new school; in St. Stephen a new school; in Fredericton a new vocational school proposed. He thanked the nurses for their co-operation.

Dr. Cyr, Campbellton, reported 481 schools examined; 11,297 children examined; 6,284 notices of defects sent to parents; 3,394 vaccinations; not as much contagious diseases as last year. Dr. LeBlanc, Moncton, inspected 263 schools; vaccinated 3,265; inspected 6,646 pupils; out of 55 defects in Salloway school 44 had been remedied; vaccination was a bone of contention in Kent county; 95 per cent of vaccinations were effective.

Dr. Melvin reported that short directions for the care of arms after vaccination had been prepared for distribution to children and parents.

Hon. Dr. Roberts.
Hon. Dr. Roberts said that he was greatly pleased with the reports and the progress the province was making in public health work. There was a great work still to do he said. The grant of the Rockefeller Foundation for the medical inspection of schools was a great honor to have conferred on the province. Preventive medicine was the medicine of today, he said. He expressed the greatest commendation of the work of the late Dr. J. A. McCarthy. His work at the Health Centre was a monument to his ability. The same could be said of the late Mrs. MacLean, who had been his assistant in the social hygiene clinic. He also spoke of the nursing ser-

vice in the province saying that the Rockefeller offer was well known and that an effort would be made to bring this matter before the municipalities in the near future. 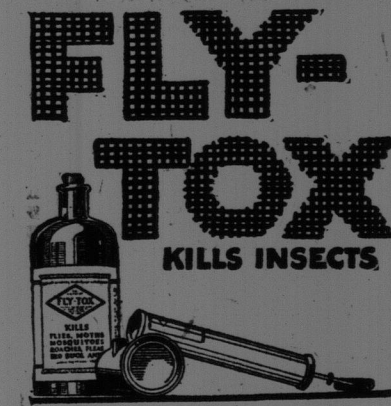

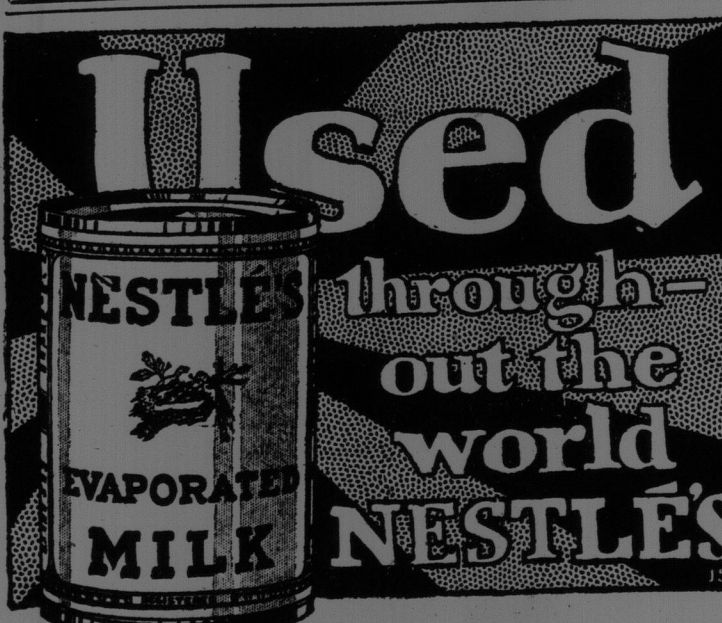
