

"ROSEBUD DAY" SUCCESS

Rosebud Day figures were not available early today but the results were thought to be very gratifying. A meeting of the executive of the council was held in the Children's Aid home during the latter part of the afternoon after the members had visited the seven children of Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Pierce who had been placed in the home on the previous day, having been taken from a home where their mothers had willfully neglected them, although one woman was in receipt of a pension of \$88 and lack of money in no way accounted for the deplorable state of the children as to lack of nourishment and clothing. The members spoke with the Victorian order nurse who has special care of these children, who are kept isolated from the other inmates because of the contagious skin disease with which they are affected. The meeting passed a resolution of protest against the neglect of the mothers of these seven children. It was felt that, if there was no law on the statute books to deal with such cases, the women of St. John should see that such law should be passed and enforced. The censure of the council was doubly harsh from the consideration of the fact that lack of funds could not be made an excuse in the matter. A committee, consisting of Mrs. T. M. Vincent and Mrs. J. A. Mulcahy, was appointed to interview the S. F. C. in order to ascertain what ruling exists in order that preventive measures might be taken against the recurrence of such cases in the future. Hearty votes of thanks were passed to the editors of the local papers for generous assistance rendered in their appeals made in the editorial columns of their respective papers. The council felt that a great deal of the generous response received was due to kindness of the editors. Others to whom votes of thanks were extended were Steve Matthews for material appeal; W. H. 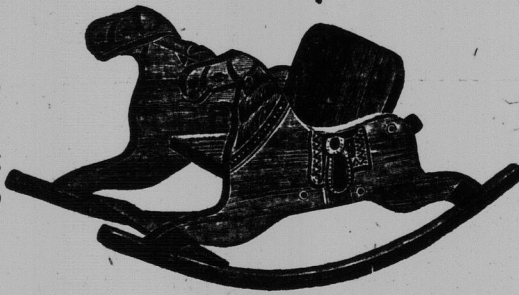

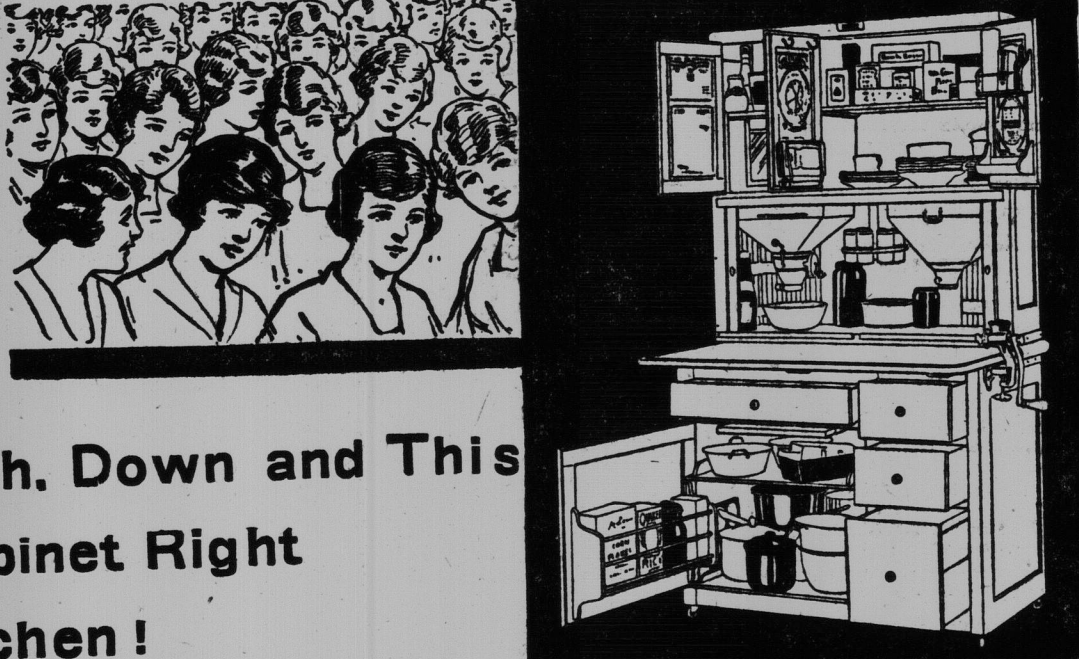
