GREEKS WANT FREEDOM FROM TURK DOMINATION

The appeal of the Greeks for freedom from the domination of the Turks and Bulgarians in Macedonia, Thrace, Asia Minor and the Islands of the Dodecanese was voiced recently by John N. Metaxa, formerly governor of Saloniki, in an address he delivered before the Harvard University Club in Boston.

Dr. Metaxa declared that the great majority of the Greeks in Epirus, Macedonia, Thrace and Asia Minor were still in bondage. "Now," he said, "the critical moment is at hand when the great debt owed Hellenism by civilization may be repaid. It is on behalf of the liberation, the self-determination, the human dignity of these millions that I have come to implore the aid of your great country."

"People of America, be the first to acknowledge this debt. Help us not only by expressing your sympathy but by actually proclaiming to the world your determination that the Turk be sent back to his lair, and that for the Greek people the day of liberty and national independence shall at last dawn."
In support of the Greek demand for the restoration of the territory he outlined Dr. Metaxa reviewed the history of the Byzantine empire and the centuries during which it maintained civilization's bulwark against the hordes of Turks and Bulgarians. In Constantinople, he said, there are now 354,469 Greeks and a total of 735,559 Christians and Jews, as against 440,114 Turks. In Asia Minor he said there are 1,017,300 Greeks and in Smyrna more than twice as many Greeks as Turks. In northern Epirus the Greeks numbered 107,557; in the Dodecanese Islands, the Twelve Islands of the Aegean, there were 120,727 Greeks.

In Thrace, he said, the Greek cities of Yanthi and Ghioamoudjina were under over the Bulgars by the treaty of Bucharest while there were more Greeks than Turks in the vilayet of Adrianople, the second city of the Turkish empire.

AS HIS FATHER SAW HIM

William Hohenzollern's Character Laid Bare in Letter to Bismarck.

On the authority of Herr Ernst Goetz of Leipzig the Berlin Tageblatt of Dec. 11 published a letter sent by Emperor Frederick to Bismarck in 1886. The letter has an intimate reference to the emperor's son, now known as William, and is dated Potsdam, 1886.
Frederick was then crown prince, as father, William I, was still alive. After two years both were dead. In three and a half years the young emperor had dismissed Bismarck, whose offices are requested in the following manner:
"My son, Prince William, without my knowing about it, has expressed to his majesty (the Emperor William I) a desire during the coming winter to make closer acquaintance with the activity of our ministries. Consequently, as I hear, he plan has already been contemplated to Gastein of employing him in the foreign office."
"As I have not yet received official information about it from any quarter, consider it necessary in the first place to address myself confidentially to you, in order to learn what has already been
