REGIMENT FOR HALIFAX.
Halifax, like other military headquarters in Canada, is to have a garrison regiment and its strength is to be 2,000. It will be part of the Canadian expeditionary force, but will be for home guard duty. The new regiment is expected to absorb all the regular school units and in addition all such members of the militia units as are willing to enter the service and come under the military service act.

BOYS CHARGED WITH THEFT OF TUB OF BUTTER

Man Who Bought 31 Pounds From Them for \$9 Out His Money

Two juveniles, previous offenders both, were lined up before Magistrate Ritchie in the juvenile court on charges of stealing a tub containing eight pounds of butter from the market on Saturday and selling it for a little more than \$9 in a Brussels street store. The detectives located the butter and confiscated it, and as the boys had no money, it was presumed that all the proceeds have been spent and the buyer is out his money. The boys were remanded until Wednesday morning. One boy was charged with not giving a satisfactory account of himself, and was sent below.

EIGHT IN COURT ON DRUNKENNESS CHARGE

A holiday assortment of inebriates were lined up before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning, when no fewer than eight prisoners were present on drunkenness charge. They were all fined \$8, although several were told they were liable to \$200 fine for having liquor in possession. They were all sent below. MONCTON SOLDIER WOUNDED

Moncton, N. B., April 29.—Mrs. Jennie Lockhart has received word that her husband, Pte. Claude Eugene Lockhart, has been wounded and admitted to the 12th Field Ambulance, suffering from gunshot wound in the left leg. He is a son of William Lockhart of Moncton and has been in France about eighteen months.

JUST LIKE NEW BRUNSWICK

The Bureau of Markets of the United States Department of Agriculture, says: Estimates tell of 1,800,000 pounds of potatoes still unsold in the United States. Experts are agreed that only great efforts and moderate retail prices will move them. Many people in the United States will eat potatoes three times a day, if they are offered plentifully and the price is kept within their reach. To hold back potatoes now means grave danger of a demoralized market later on, or else millions of pounds lost as human food.

VACCINATE ALL THE PEOPLE IN CARLETON AND IN LANCASTER

Precautionary Measure Because of
Smallpox Cases Recently Discovered

Preparations for the vaccination of all persons residing in West St. John and Lancaster are being completed by the board of health of the city and county, under authority of the provincial board of health. This is a precautionary measure due to the fact that these districts were more or less exposed to the disease by patients now in the isolation hospital before the nature of their illness was learned. So far, as no cases have been found in other parts of the city, the general vaccination plan has not been ordered for any portion on the eastern side of the harbor.

ton for treatment and there underwent an operation; eventually pneumonia developed and his death ensued. After announcing the arrangements for the funeral, His Lordship referred to Father O'Donovan's life and work. He was, said Bishop LeBlanc, a well known priest who had lived and labored on either side of the harbor for many years, in fact all his priestly life. He was not only well known but was held in the highest respect by all classes. He had the faculty of making friends and retaining their friendship. Even during his illness in the Boston hospital he was a comfort to his friends in the short time he was there and all about him felt very badly as well as the people at home, when it was realized that he could not recover.

Father O'Donovan, said His Lordship, had done a great work. He had labored faithfully for the spiritual welfare of his people well as in material work for the church. His church and house and grounds were always kept in perfect condition and all were a credit not only to the parish but would be to any large city. He had always shown excellent taste. "We all realize," said Bishop LeBlanc in conclusion, "how great loss is the church, the city and diocese. I trust that you will not forget him in your prayers."

Feeling References.

In St. Peter's church Father Costello spoke of Father O'Donovan's qualities as a friend, saying he was a friend indeed to all, wealth made no distinction. High and low, rich and poor, Catholic or non-Catholic, mattered not to this generous son of Erin. He alluded to his work in the Lord's vineyard, where he toiled without murmur. He exhorted the people to pray for the repose of his soul.

In Holy Trinity church Very Rev. J. J. Walsh, V. G., addressed his congregation regarding the great loss to the Catholic church in the death of Father O'Donovan. He referred to his works as a priest of God and asked his congregation to pray for the repose of his soul. Not only by his own was Father O'Donovan known, loved and respected, but by others not of his belief.

Rev. C. Collins of St. Rose's church, Fairville, spoke with feeling reference to the death of Father O'Donovan. He had known him for many years and had found him always a friend who had gained the respect and confidence of his people. Father O'Donovan's friends reached into the sphere of those outside his church as non-Catholic and Catholic alike were his friends. He spoke of the great work he had accomplished. He exhorted the people to pray for him.

In St. John's Baptist church, Broad street, Rev. F. J. McMurray said that the death of Father O'Donovan had taken from the people a true and beloved friend and from the church a pious and devoted priest. He also said that when the corner-stone of the St. John's church was laid, Father O'Donovan was given charge and while there he helped materially in clearing off the debt of the church and when he had left to take charge of the parish of the Assumption on the West Side a large part of the debt had been cleared away. Father O'Donovan would be much missed.

Rev. Father Healey, C. S. S. R., of St. Peter's parish, occupied the pulpit of the Assumption church yesterday morning. He paid a glowing tribute to Father O'Donovan, regarding his works among the people and exhorted the congregation to offer up their prayers for the repose of his soul.

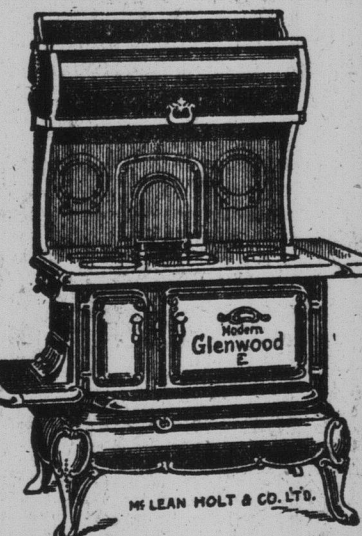
