The Pious German Pastor.

The wild-eyed insanity of the German clergy has been shown in many quotations from their sermons during the war, which have been found in copies of German newspapers. These clergymen preach ferociously and endeavor to show that the most barbarous deeds are the very flowering of Christ's teaching. The London Globe reproduces the following entitled "Through Turpitude to Jesus" by a German pastor:

"Our Divine Redeemer is a lover of peace. So are we, but the peace that the Lord wants must be a lasting peace and not peace can be lasting except the one that dings as Courtland, the mining regions of Longwy and Briey, and bases for our fleet to serve as future starting points in any eventual war with England. The latter our 'Turpitude,' a man after Christ's own heart, can assure us. Warlike Nazarene, whose ardent patriotism is only equalled by his devotion to his Divine Master."

Much has been said about the necessity that exists for getting the facts about this war before the German people so that they may fairly judge the whole case. But however much they may have been cheated by their military rulers of the truth in regard to the war, they had at least, Christian teaching in their possession, and one can see how blasphemously they have perverted it. "Will be there my good" seems to have been the decision they have reached.

BLOT ON ENGLISH EFFORT.

Major Louis W. Moffitt writes to Christian Guardian Regarding London's Moral.

Writing to the Christian Guardian of the conference of Protestant chaplains in the First Army held in Northern France, Honorary Major Louis W. Moffitt, senior chaplain of the 2nd Canadian Division, H.Q., and a member of the Toronto Methodist conference, says: "About half of the chaplains from the Canadian corps attended the conference, which was very stimulating and helpful. 'Perhaps the most remarkable feature' of the discussion of our denominational differences. The question of episcopal ordination was frankly faced and recognized as the only, at present, insurmountable obstacle. Were the leaders of the Established Church in England to meet representatives of the conference in the same Christian spirit that was displayed by their leaders on that occasion, I feel sure that it would not be long before we would see a union that would make the Church of England truly what its name implies, and what at present it certainly is not—a national church."

"I have just read Dr. Chown's statement regarding moral conditions in London. I consider that he is more than justified in all that he says, and it is the one dark blot on the shield of English effort during the war that they should permit such conditions to exist in war-time."

"I trust that you are preparing for demobilization, so as to be in some measure ready to meet its problems. It appears to me that the two things to be prepared for are:

(1) The inevitable reaction toward social pleasures that will follow the return of the men, and which will be largely increased by good-intentioned folk who will try to give the boys a good time. The church should lay some plans to guide that reaction, as far as possible, into channels that will be helpful instead of harmful to moral and religious welfare of the men."

(2) The minimizing, as far as possible, of the social friction of getting things readjusted to their place in the industrial and commercial life of the country."

MUST BE NO QUIBBLES AS TO BELGIUM AND REPARATION IN FULL MUST BE MADE

Text of Belgian Reply to Pope Definitely Declares Indispensable Conditions of Peace so Far as King Albert's Country is Concerned

Harve, Jan. 23.—King Albert, in endorsing the Belgian government's reply to the Pope's peace proposal, wrote a personal letter as follows:

"Very Holy Father—I have taken note with lively sympathy and interest of the message Your Holiness was good enough to send to the heads of the belligerent countries the first of August, and have hastened to submit it to my government, which has studied it with most serious and deferential attention. The result of that study has been recorded in a note which I am happy to communicate to Your Holiness."

"In associating myself with the wishes of the Holy See that a just and durable peace may promptly put an end to the evils from which humanity, and particularly the Belgian people, so rudely tried, are suffering, I beg Your Holiness to believe in my filial and respectful attachment."

This letter was dated Dec. 37, 1917.

The note of the Belgian government says: "The royal government, as soon as it received the message of Your Holiness to the heads of the belligerents, hastened to reply that it would study with the greatest deference the propositions of the document expressed in such elevating language."

"At the same time it desired particularly to express its lively and profound gratitude for the particular interest the Holy Father manifested in the Belgian nation, and of which the document was new and serious proof."

"At the outset of his message the Holy Father took pains to declare he had forced himself to maintain perfect impartiality toward all the belligerents, which renders more significant the judgment of His Holiness when he commends in favor of the total evacuation of Belgium and the re-establishment of its full independence and also recognizes the right of Belgium for reparation for all damages and the cost of the war."

"Already in his consoling allocution of Jan. 22, 1915, the Holy Father had proclaimed before the world that he recognized the justice and the necessity for reparation in the case of Belgium, and that he had directly in view."
