### General Post Office

Reduction of postage rate on newspapers, magazines and trade journals sent from the United Kingdom to Newfoundland or from Newfoundland to the United Kingdom will become effective on and after the 1st December instant.

Newspapers and periodicals registered as such in Newfoundland or the United Kingdom will be forwarded at a special rate of two cents (10 per lb., but newspapers not exceeding 2 ounces in weight are transmissible as heretofore for 1 cent (4d). In case of packet weighing over 1 lb., any fraction of a lb. is counted as a pound.

Packets intended for transmission must be posted in covers open at both ends, and easily removable for the purpose of examination.

No packet of newspapers or magazines posted for transmission at this rate must exceed in weight 5 lbs., or exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth.

### The S. A. Band

### Visits Conception Bay Towns

The S. A. Band of No. 2 Corps, St. John's, in charge of Staff-Capt. W. H. Cave, are touring Conception Bay towns this week and rendering a musical programme in most of the principal places. They left St. John's on Saturday, Jan. 22, and proceeded direct to Carbonear. While the train was stopped for a few moments at Bay Roberts station the band stepped on to the platform and serenaded this town by playing a couple of selections. The first concert took place in the S. A. Citadel at Carbonear Saturday night. Hundreds turned out to listen to the strains of music sweet, and all present voted the performance a rare treat. Meetings were also held Sunday morning, afternoon and night. Staff-Capt. Cave had charge, and nine conversations resulted.

On Monday night the musical programme was repeated in the S. A. Citadel at St. John's, where another large and appreciative audience was present. Taking the train at St. John's Tuesday afternoon the band came as far as Bay Roberts, where they detained and marched to Port-de-Grave, a distance of about four miles, playing lively airs as they went. The programme was again given at that place Tuesday evening, and returned made to Bay Roberts Wednesday morning. During the evening some delightful music was played at night at the S. A. Citadel a large and attentive audience was present to show their appreciation of their efforts in rendering such an interesting and delightful programme, which was well received and applauded for about two hours, during which time not a dull moment was experienced.

### Opening of the House

The opening of the second session of the 22nd General Assembly of Newfoundland took place on Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 23rd, at 3 o'clock. Thousands of people filled the grounds in front of the House of Parliament. The Constabulary, Brigades and R. N. R. were lined up on either side of the grounds, and when His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams and suite drove up, the G.L.B. band played the National Anthem.

### Legislative Council

After the departure of His Excellency and suite at 3.30 p.m. Wednesday, the business of the Council for the present session was taken up. Hon. J. A. Robinson proposed that the Legislative Council should meet on Tuesday, Jan. 24th, at 10 a.m.

### House of Assembly

After the formal opening of the Legislature by His Excellency the Governor, the members of the House of Assembly returned to their Chamber when the Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne was moved by Mr. R. A. Squires, the member for Trinity, and ably seconded by Mr. R. J. Devereaux, the member for Placentia and St. Mary's.

Sir Robert Bond, Leader of the Opposition, followed with a criticism of the speech. He was in turn followed by the Premier, Sir E. P. Morris.

After a committee was appointed to draft the Address in Reply, the House adjourned at 7.20 until 4 p.m. Thursday.
