WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY. Progress in the Interest of Ships, Their Crews and Passengers.


The Progress in the and Passengers. (New York Herald.) The value of wireless telegraphy as a means of communication at sea and between ships and shore stations was again made plain by the recent experi-ence of an English channel mail boat. During a late voyage messages were received on board from the lightship stationed 20 odd miles off Dunkirk de-claring that the lanterns could not be illuminated the next night unless speedy aid were sent from the coast. This appeal was fopcated by the steam-er to the station at La Panne, and the required assistance was sent in season.
