The Teamsters' Union made a commendable move last night when it passed a resolution urging the city authorities to take steps to place a proper pavement on Indian town hill.

A fine trout is on exhibition in the window of Robert Garnett's saloon, King square, today. The fish, which was taken from Trevelick's Lake Monday night by David Garnett, is 20 inches in length and weighs five pounds.

The damage done by fire to the Gold King mine was \$150,000, not \$125,000 as was reported. The buildings were at the upper terminal of the mine and were old and out of repair.

As the Herald has frequently pointed out, the Majestic is altogether inadequate for the river service, but there is no reason in the world why she should not carry a supply of decent drinking water for the convenience of her passengers. We feel that it is only necessary to call the attention of Manager Orchard to this grievance in order to have steps taken to remove it.—Fredericton Herald.
