LOW WATER AFFECTS TEXTILE CONCERNS

Drought Threatened In Merrimac Valley And Lowell Factories May Have To Close

Lowell, Mass., Aug. 16.—At the offices of the Locks and Canals Company in this city it was given out today that there is grave danger of a serious drought this fall in the Merrimac river valley, on the waters of which millions of textile spindles still partially depend for their motive power. Lake Winnepesaukee, the 17 acre reservoir for the river is lower than on any record ever kept. The Locks and Canals Company attributes the situation to the two dry years of 1908 and 1909 and to lack of sufficient snow last spring to offset this. The lack of water is now expected to cause considerable inconvenience to the manufacturing cities along the river. Lake Winnepesaukee is already inconvenienced by the low water.
