Maritime—Moderate to fresh westerly to northwesterly winds, fine and comparatively cool.

Toronto, Sept. 9.—From the Pacific to Lake Huron the weather today has been fine and cool while showers occurred early in the day in eastern Ontario and Quebec and later in the Maritime Provinces.

New England Forecast. Washington, D. C., Sept. 9.—The winds along the New England coast will be moderate northwest. The cool waves from the Northwest has passed across the central states and its influence now reaches to the Gulf of Mexico in the south and Appalachians in the east.
