Furness line steamship Grantley

weather.

German steamship Johannes Russ
now on her way to Brown Head for or-

large four-masted American
schooner Frontenac, Capt. Coombs,
cleared at Halifax for this port last
Wednesday. Her net register is 1457
tons.

Thursday's Portland Argus says:—
"The steamer Cabot poked her way
into the harbor yesterday morning
from Parrsboro with coal for the S.
Warren Co. This is the first cargo of
Parrsboro coal to be brought here
for a year or so. There was a
long drawn out strike at the mines
and finally they were shut down al-
together and everybody went away.
Now the Dominion Coal Company has
taken them over and they are being
operated again. There will probably
be a number of other cargoes brought
here this season from the same place.
The coast ran into to the off of Mat-
tins and from that time on it was a
case of feel along at a snail's pace
until the harbor was reached."

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Important Judgements In the Supreme Court

City Wins the Appeal in the Case Against Chief Clark, Grow-
ing Out of Hotel Metropole Raid—Decision in the Gordon
Case and in Other Actions.

The supreme court met at Frederic-
ton at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon
and delivered a number of judgments
in cases argued last term.

Hepper vs. Clark.

This case was tried at the St. John
circuit before Hon. Justice Barry with
a jury and a verdict rendered for the
plaintiff, for \$250, the action being
for illegal arrest from the Hotel Me-
tropole. The arrest had been made by
police officers and the action brought
against the chief. From this verdict
the defendant appealed. Justice White
rendered a long judgment, which the
full bench concurred (Barry, J.
no part) allowing the appeal and mak-
ing an order to have the judgment
entered for the defendant.

In the course of his remarks his
honor said that the jury had found
the defendant guilty of making the ar-
rest, but that the evidence was not
sufficient to establish the facts on the
ground that the chief of police, on the
action of his officers by making the
entry in the books some five hours af-
ter the arrest, had been made. This,
the court considered was no evidence
of approval as it was the defendant's
duty to make the entry, whether he
saw the arrest or not.
