**ROYAL MAIL LINER IN PORT WITH 240 RETURNED SOLDIERS**

The Metagama Arrived on Sunday Night and Landed Her Passengers Yesterday Morning—Big Vessel Had Good Trip From the Other Side.

The big Royal Mail Steamer Metagama arrived in port and docked Sunday night, but did not land her passengers until yesterday morning. She brought about 240 returned soldiers and quite a number of civilian passengers and a heavy mail, of which a large quantity was overseas. About 50 of the returned men are on leave for varying periods, and one or two are home for promotion and transfer to some of the units now being recruited in Canada. The men for the West left in a special train yesterday, getting away about 11.30. Of the 240 men who returned on the Metagama 34 will be dealt with at the discharge depot here, but only one of the number is a St. John man.

The trip across was very pleasant, the weather being fine all the way until Saturday when they ran into a bit of a wind. The men were more than pleased with their treatment on the voyage and had nothing but good words for the C. P. R.

**OBITUARY**

Edwin W. Barlow.

The death occurred yesterday morning of one of St. John's oldest and best known citizens in the person of Mr. Edwin W. Barlow. Mr. Barlow, who was in the 80th year of his age, was born in this city in 1837 and was a son of the late Thomas Barlow, a gentleman who occupied a prominent place in the early business and manufacturing life of the city, he having been prominently identified with the establishment of many enterprises which later reached considerable proportions, including in the number the Phoenix Foundry and the Harris Car Works.

In his younger days Mr. E. W. Barlow was a prominent member of the fire department in both the volunteer and permanent establishments. In all he spent thirty years of his life as a fireman, for ten of which he occupied the position of foreman of No. 3 Engine Company. As a fireman he was most active and even after he had reached middle age took a pride in the duty and was always one of the first on hand when the alarm sounded.

In business he was a cabin builder and was closely identified with wood building. Associated with the late Charles Frost in the firm of Frost and Barlow, he finished much of the work built by the Messrs. McLeod, Pittfield, Millidge and others of that period. Of Loyalist descent on both sides of his family he took a keen interest in the militia movements of the earlier days of the city and was a member of the old City Guards, very few of whom are now alive.

He married Miss Elizabeth Frost, who predeceased him some eleven years ago, and is survived by two children, Mrs. E. R. W. Ingraham of West St. John, with whom he made his home, and Dr. Charles W. Barlow of Providence, R. I.; also by two sisters, Mrs. S. J. Maxwell of Annapolis, N. S., and Mrs. Martha Wright of Boston.

The deceased Mr. Barlow was very well known and highly esteemed and his death marks the passing of a worthy citizen who had played well his part in all the activities of his native city. The funeral will be held on Wednesday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock from the residence of E. R. W. Ingraham, 41 Rodney street, West St. John.

Albert N. B. Dec. 25.—The death of Joseph A. Tingley occurred at the home of his brother, Miles E. Tingley, at Hopewell Hill, Friday morning. The late Mr. Tingley was a man of excellent Christian character, was the eldest son of the late Samuel Tingley of Tingley Town, parish of Harvey; his mother was a daughter of the late James Kinzie of Germantown Lake district, parish of Harvey.

Mr. Tingley was never married, but while a young man took up land in the unbroken forest in the Caledonia district in the parish of Hillsborough and made himself a very valuable farm, living entirely alone. Farming and sugar making were his chief occupations and his plots and kindly sociability brought him many friends who enjoyed his hospitality in his bachelor home where everything was neat and clean, and his cookery and maple were adjudged second to none in the district, where he spent the most of his cheerful and well appointed life.

The deceased was about seventy-eight years of age and, for some ten years past has made his home with his brother, at whose home he passed away. A very large family of stalwart men and two sisters were the offspring of the parents above named. Calvin, of one of the eastern States, Edgar of Moncton, Asa and Otis, residing on portions of the old homestead, and Miles of Hopewell, survive. Mr. Tingley was a Baptist in his religious affiliations, and a Liberal in politics.
