Consumers, Sept. 12.—That Germany might restore Belgium, with-out conditions or indomnifies in case no other country would be better standed as recards Belgium that Germany, was the belget expressed to a speech delivered at Stuttgart. Mere Von Payes was speaking on the depression felt in Germany and the allied countries, which he attributed not to recent military ev-onts but to the prospect of a fifth war winter. "If we could be sure that no other country would be better situated as regards Belgium that no unselves," said Herr Von Payer, "I believe I could venture to any that Belgium could be restored without conditions and without in-semnities."


