DEW OF DEATH TO FALL ON ARMIES IN THE NEXT WAR

Horrors of Future Conflict Are Pointed Out by Military Experts of U. S. Army.

Washington, Nov. 1.—The Dew of Death! The next war will be more horrible than the last world catastrophe.

This prediction, frequently heard from not only army and navy experts but from the average citizen, seems certain of fulfillment unless some summary action is taken in the forthcoming Washington conference to prohibit or restrict the use of these latest war devices.

One of the three main subjects to be taken up at the conference under the broad question of limitation of armament is "Rules for control of new agencies of warfare." The Chemical Warfare Service of the American Army is believed to possess today the deadliest poisonous gas in the world. This is called "Lewisite," a gas developed during the latter part of the war by Winford Lee Lewis, a professor of chemistry of Northwestern University, but never used in the last war.

A quantity of this gas, equivalent to three drops, reaching a man's body in liquid form, will kill. Lewisite is similar to mustard gas, a burning gas which caused the major portion of the gas casualties of the war.

Gas was never used from airplanes during the war, but it is understood that the Chemical Warfare Service is prepared, in a future war, to let down from fleets of aircraft a veritable rain of most powerful gases.

These gases would be released from tanks carried by airplanes, as a light drift to earth in liquid form, as a light rain or dew. The mustard gas evaporates more slowly than does the Lewisite, thus retaining its power for injury by burning longer, but Lewisite is the deadliest of the two.

A picture can thus be gained of airplanes, in a future war, letting down this "dew of death" on armies in the field, and on cities in back of the firing lines, should this be resorted to.

The Chemical Warfare Service knows that clothing, soaked with heavy linseed oil, can be made to protect the wearer from this gas, but it is also equally true that men cannot stand the wearing of such clothing for long. Complete protection from poisonous gas seems impossible.

Pointing out the importance of the use of poisonous gas in war, Brigadier General Amos Fries of the Chemical Warfare Service said:

Sacco-Vanzetti's Case Hits Argentine Labor
Communists Urge Agitation to Help Comrades.

Buenos Aires, Nov. 1.—The refusal of the Buenos Aires police to permit the holding of a meeting of protest on behalf of Sacco and Vanzetti, two Italian anarchists under conviction of murder in Massachusetts, was followed today by the publication of an appeal by the Communist branch of the Argentine Labor Federation, asking upon the workers to initiate "a campaign of agitation in behalf of our worthy comrades."

The lives of Sacco and Vanzetti, who are described as victims of the exploitation of the "Yankee bourgeoisie," are declared to depend upon the protest of the Argentine proletariat. It is necessary, therefore, the manifesto argues, to exercise pressure upon the United States Government to obtain the liberty of these men, who the document alleges, were convicted upon false testimony inspired by plutocratic interests.

Montevideo, Uruguay, Nov. 1.—Special guards were placed around the United States Legation in this city today in anticipation of possible disorders during the general strike this afternoon in protest against the conviction for the murder of the Italian Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti.

Blind, He Identifies Shooter By Voice

Police Accept Old Man's Word and Arrest His Boyhood Friend.

New York, Nov. 1.—Though Andrew Anderson, 76, of 29 Coffey street, Brooklyn, has been blind for years, the police last night accepted his identification of Thomas Rickerson, 26, as the man who shot him and arrested Rickerson on a charge of felonious assault.

Anderson, who is in Long Island College Hospital with bullet wounds in his abdomen and back, the motive for the shooting is a mystery.

Anderson, who is blind, is usually seen by his daughter Anna. He was sitting in bed in his apartment yesterday when he heard, he said, some one moving about the room. Anderson's hearing, as is frequently the case with the blind, is unusually keen. He called "Who is there?" a voice which he says he recognized as Rickerson's mumbled something and a shot was fired, which struck him in the stomach. "What do you do to that?" Anderson said he called out.

The answer was that he had known Rickerson from boyhood and had befriended him and given him money and shelter on numerous occasions and could not be mistaken in his voice. The police found Rickerson in a restaurant near Third Avenue and Thirty-ninth street and took him to the hospital, where Anderson again identified him. Rickerson denied the shooting, though neighbors of Anderson's say, according to the police, they saw him run from the house after it.
