

The Camera in War.

The camera has taken an important place in the panoply of war, and the official commissioned photographer is of more consequence than nine-tenths of the nation's forces, instead, the newest and ged out by the horse. in full uniform of the leaders of the most inmportant use of the war camera is most immportant use of the war camera is the photography of projectiles. At first the principle use of the camera was in taking photographs of battlefields and fortifications from balloons. Valuable work of this kind was done in the Crimean and in the Mexican wars. Photo-metery, or land surveying by photographs, was first practised in the Franco-Prussian war.

The most important service of the camera recently has been in photograph-ing projectiles during flight and the move-ments of projectiles and their effects on armour-plates and other tragets. It is now provide to chaterraph the air moves sur-

Krupp works recently in the one two-millionth of a second. This marvellous snap-shot work has opened an entirely new field of investigation. Photographs taken at this speed catch a moving bullet as clearly as though it were at rest. The pictures show that the bullet compresses the air in front, producing a wave like the prow of a moving ship. The bullet leaves a wake of confused air-currents for some distance behind it, much the same as a ship. It has been found in this way that a great deal of the bullet's force i wasted in producing sound waves. The photographs taken at this speed of pro jectiles striking armour give many curious
