

DIES IN LONDON

Born in Rothesay and Educated in Fredericton-Reached the Highest Office in the British Navv.

A Canadian press cable from London says: "The Death of Admiral Sir Charles Carter Drury occured today at the age of sixty-eight.

Vice-Admiral Sir Charles Carter Drury,
K. C. S. I. (1903), K. C. B. (1906), G. C.
V. O. (1907), F. R. G. S., was bom

was the second son of Le Baron Drury

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Admiral Drury was educated at the Collegiate School, Fredericton, and entered the royal navy in 1859. He became sub-lieutenant, 1865; lieutenant 1868; commander, 1878; captain 1885; rear-admiral 1899; A. D. C. to the queen, 1897-99; naval advisor to inspector general of fortifications, 1865-88; flag-captain North American and West Indies, H. M. S. "Bellerophon," 1889-92; member ordance committee, 1898-94; flag-captain H. M. S. "Royal Sovereign" (Channel squadron) 1894-95; H. M. S. "Hood," (Mediterranean) 1896-98; senior officer Gibralter, 1898-99; vice-president ordance committee, 1900, commander-inchief, (East Indies) 1902-03; commander-inchief, Mediterranean, 1907-08; commander-in-chief, Mediterranean, 1907-08; commander-in-chief, Mediterranean, 1907-08; commander-in-chief, at the Nore, 1908-11, when he retired from the active list; second naval lord of the Admiralty, 1903-08; represented the royal navy at the Delhi Durbar, 1908.

He had received the following decorations: Legion d'Honneur; Grand Cross of the Royal Regiment of the Order of the Redeemer, of Greece; Grand Cross of the Royal Regiment of the Order of Red Eagle, Germany; received thanks of the British Poreign Office for services in Crete, 1896.

His recreations were fishing, shooting, riding, cycling and golf. He was a member of the United Service Club, Travellers' Club, (London), Royal Naval Club, (Portsmouth), and honorary member, Royal Yacht Squadron, (Cowes).
