BIAFRA—PERMISSION FOR DAYLIGHT FLIGHTS

Mr. Andrew Brewin (Greenwood): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Secretary of State for External Affairs. In the light of the renewed threat of mass starvation in Biafra, will the government accept the proposal made by Canairelief and use its good offices with the federal government of Nigeria to get it to accept or permit daylight flights into Uli airport?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, I have had representations from this organization which I intend to reply to shortly. I just received a telegram. I can assure the hon, member that we have been trying for months to get daylight flights accepted. The preliminary response from Colonel Ojukwu indicates that daylight flights are available with certain conditions. Whether these conditions are acceptable to the Nigerian authorities, we are not sure.

KENNEDY ROUND-AGREEMENT BY U.S. TO TARIFF REDUCTIONS—BENEFIT TO CONSUMERS

Mr. J. G. Lind (Middlesex): Mr. Speaker, I wish to address my question to the Minister of Finance. Is the United States government agreeable to reducing its tariffs on our products in the same proportion as we have done in the Kennedy round of tariff reductions, as announced in the recent budget?

Hon. E. J. Benson (Minister of Finance): Mr. Speaker, the matter of a reduction of our tariffs by an average of three percentage points on some \$2 billion worth of exports was designed for purely Canadian purposes and we sought no quid pro quo. It was designed to help in the fight against inflation in this country. However, I did stress in Washington that we in the Canadian government looked forward to further major negotiations with regard to reduction of non-tariff barriers as well as tariffs in the future.
