religious persuasions of the people, it was found that out of a population of 7,954,760, there were Roman Catholics, 6,436,060; members of the Established Church, including Methodists, 853,160; Presbyterians, 643,658; other Dissenters, 21,882. The present return gives the Methodists, separately, as numbering 44,532. If we add this number to the members of the Established Church in the census of 1861, we shall have 723,193. Comparing thes figures with the returns of 1834, we obtain the following results:—During the generation that has passed since that census, the population of Ireland has diminished by 2,190,217; the Roman Cathalic population by 1,945,477; the Church of England population (including the Methodist) by 129,967; the Presbyterians by 114,666. The other Protestant denominations have been diminished about one-half.

BRIBERY AT ELECTIONS.—Both the candidates for Wakefield, at the general election in 1859, have now been convicted of bribery by juries of their coutrymen. It was believed that the Conservative candidate, Mr. J. C. D. Charlesworth, would have escaped this degradation, as he escaped it at the spring assizes, in consequence of a principal witness Mr. Fernandez, having refused to answer questions which bore upon the bribery.—For his contumacy Mr. Fernandez was committed to prison, and moreover, fined 2500. mitted to prison, and moreover, fined 2500.

This punishment produced its effect, for at the recent trial at York, Mr. Fernandez, who looked pale and ill, from the effects of his long confinement, was much more communilong confinement, was much more communicative, and said and proved enough to secure Mr. Charlesworth's conviction. In the way of example these prosecutions and convictions will do good, and, commencing with the really guilty parties—the candidates, who furnish the money when it is unduly squandered in a corrupt manner,—the primary offenders are reached; but the process is painfully circuitous, and involves an expenditure that is deterring. The defendants will not be brought up for judgment before November, and considerable curiosity will be awakened to know the extent and the manner of the punishment. It would be a be awakened to know the extent and the manner of the punishment. It would be a stange sight to see a barrister and a banker sentenced to hard labor for corrupting the electoral morals of the people; but judges have a great tendency to mercy in cases where the offenders are men of wealth and sition .- Wilmer and Smith's Times.
