Wm. Shugg, a pioneer resident of Alvinston district, died a few days ago.

Leamington's clerk, who is also the treasurer, draws a yearly salary of \$2,400.

Some Toronto Conservatives are predicting a general election in Ontario about next June.

Mrs. James D. Dewan, wife of Strathroy's first mayor, died suddenly on Jan. 19th, in her 77th year.

The Saskatchewan farmers' club has fixed the scale of farm hands' wages for 1922 at \$35 a month, with board.

A company has been incorporated at Bowden, Alberta, capitalized at \$100,000, for the growing of mustard seed.

W. Bishop of Highgate has purchased a sawy mill at Melbourne and has moved it to Mr. Lusty's bush near Rodney.

It cost 13.9 cents per day to feed each prisoner at the Middlesex county jail during the three months ending December 31.

Aldborough council appointed D. W. Graham assessor for 1922 at a salary of \$150 and D. M. Campbell collector at a salary of \$150.

Union bricklayers of London have signed an agreement accepting 85c an hour, a reduction of 15c an hour from the wage paid last year.

For the second time within a year a Canton, O., high school teacher is ill from pneumonia contracted while demonstrating chlorine gas to a class.

It is reported that a Warton farmer sold two turkeys in that town at \$10 each, purchased a horse for \$19 and went home with the extra dollar in his pocket.

A number of fake solicitors are on the road taking subscriptions for Toronto journals and magazines. Be careful that you are not giving away good money for nothing.

Fred W. Love, a leading shoe merchant of Aylmer, dropped dead at his home there on Saturday evening. George Love, manager of the Royal Bank at Wardsville, is a brother.

C. H. Ivey, senior member of the law firm of Elliott & Ivey, London, died suddenly in West Middlesex on Jan. 1st. Mr. Ivey left for Italy about three weeks ago on a trip for his health.

In Petrolia there is being exhibited a two-quart sealer of cherries preserved by Mrs. W. H. Pearson in Woodstock in 1897, which are said to have retained all the flavor of youth. It is seldom one sees fruit a quarter of a century old.

Oil is reported to have been found on a farm near Keweenaw. Options have been secured by a Peterboro company on a large tract of land in Adelaide township, and it is expected that drilling operations will be active within a few days.

Duncan C. Ross, a member of the House of Commons for West Middlesex since 1909, and who unsuccessfully contested the constituency in the recent general elections in the Liberal interests, has been appointed county court judge of the county of Elgin.

Horace Greeley, born in New Hampshire, used to advise young men to go West, but New Hampshire now asks young men to come East. The Board of Publicity believes that cheap lands, good roads, a short haul and unusual markets offer an argument that will appeal to many farmers in the Middle West who have abandoned the staples and who have gone in for raising vegetables and other special kinds of food.

The death took place at Bothwell on January 15 of Elizabeth McGugan, 87 years old. The funeral was held from the home of her niece, Peterborne Gage of Cairo. Mrs. McGugan was the daughter of Duncan and Jean Campbell of Cairo. She was born at Cornwall, Glengarry, and at the age of 2 years came with her parents to the 8th concession of Euphonia. In 1864 she married Archibald McGugan. She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Peter Kitchen of California, and several nephews and nieces.

The St. Thomas Times-Journal says: The county police have been asked to investigate a case in Aldborough township where a negro of London is alleged to be keeping house for several negroes engaged in cutting wood for Thomas Dykes of that locality. The report received by the police is that the woman has left five small children in London unprotected for. She has two children with her.

Cases in the London, Ont., police court last year show an increase of 1,029 over 1920. During 1921, 4,530 cases came before the court with 3,644 convictions, while in 1920 there were 3,510 cases and 2,717 convictions. There has been a steady increase in crime since 1917. O. T. A. infractions, other than drunks, show a decided decrease over 1920. The crime list shows 40 autos and 91 bicycles stolen in 1921.

TRAGEDY OF A NIGHT

Mrs. Alex. Hyndman Burned to Death in Her Home

A shocking affair occurred in Glencoe at an early hour on Friday morning when Mrs. Agnes Hyndman, widow of the late Alexander Hyndman, was burned to death in her home, which was totally destroyed.

Mrs. Hyndman, who was in feeble health, lived alone in her cottage on O'Mara street, and it is presumed that while carrying a lighted coal oil lamp it fell from her hand and set fire to her clothing and also to the furnishings of her bedroom. In an effort to extinguish the flames she appears to have gone from the front part of the house to the kitchen and secured a pail of water which was there. Her charred body was found beside the pail in the kitchen.

John W. Mitchell, who lives about a block away, was waiting on a sick child and was the first to see the fire, having had his attention attracted by its reflection on the window. He lost no time in raising an alarm, and first awoke Tom Haggitt, whose house was next to that of Mrs. Hyndman's. At this time the front part of Mrs. Hyndman's house was in flames. Mr. Mitchell ran for more assistance and Mr. Haggitt, after getting into a few articles of clothing, started for the fire hall. Surprising that Mrs. Hyndman might be helpless in the burning house, Mr. Haggitt turned back and seeing her form lying on the floor of the kitchen, which by this time was aflame, burst open the back door and at the risk of his life rushed in and secured the body and carried it outside. Life was then extinct.

Coroner Dr. Woods of Mount Brydges was notified of the occurrence and on arriving and learning the circumstances considered an inquest unnecessary.

The late Mrs. Hyndman was in her 69th year and was a daughter of the late Duncan Taylor of Ekfrid. Before her marriage she taught school, and for a time was the teacher in S. S. No. 5, Ekfrid, her home school. She was well liked by all and had a large number of personal friends.

The funeral service was held on Saturday afternoon at the home of her sister, Mrs. Malcolm D. McAlpine, of Ekfrid, and was conducted by Rev. D. G. Paton, minister of the Glencoe Presbyterian church, of which she had been a member for many years. Interment was made at Oakland cemetery.

Mr. Owen of Wallacestown. Rev. Mr. Cooke, moderator, then read the induction service, after which Rev. Mr. Malcolm of Cowal addressed the minister and Rev. Mr. Carr of West Lorne addressed the congregation regarding their duties to each other. Special music was furnished by the choir. After the service a bountiful repast was provided by the ladies of the congregation.

The official opening of Glencoe's new skating rink, The Carman Arena, was made on Wednesday night of last week by Reeve McPherson, who spoke briefly to a large gathering, congratulating the community on having acquired so splendid a place for winter pastimes. Rev. T. J. Charlton also spoke his approval of the efforts that were successfully carried out for providing wholesome amusement for the young.

The event was marked by holding the first fancy dress carnival of the season, in which a hundred or more skaters of the community participated, while a large throng of spectators enjoyed with critical eye the varied costumes and spectacular features in general. Music furnished by the Alvinston brass band added to the pleasure of the occasion. ANOTHER PIONEER PASSES

The community suffered the loss of possibly its oldest member and the last of a family of eight in the person of Mrs. Archibald Graham, who died on January 27th at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. P. B. Wade, Dorchester.

Mrs. Graham, who was a daughter of the late Neil Galbraith, was born in Dunwich township in 1829 and moved to Ekfrid with her parents in early infancy. She was married to the late Archibald Graham, who predeceased her some thirteen years, in March, 1852, and has lived under five sovereigns.

The funeral took place on Monday, January 30, from her home, the residence of her son Archie, and the throngs of relatives and friends who were present testify to the high esteem in which she was held. The funeral was conducted by Rev. D. G. Paton and the sermon, preached by Rev. Mr. Veal of Dorchester, close friend of the deceased, who said of her: "She has fought a good fight; she has finished her course; she has kept the faith and that never in his fifty years of ministry had he met a more sincere and earnest Christian. A charitable and unselfish assumption of the troubles of others endeared her to all her neighbors and friends throughout the years of her sojourn here."

The pallbearers were her grandsons—D. K. Archie and John McRae, A. M. Graham and John Wade, and her nephews, Thos. Galbraith, Thos. flowers were carried by another grandson, Duncan Graham, and by Alvin Hagerty.

She leaves behind to mourn her five sons—Neil Archie and John of Glencoe, Duncan of Strathroy and Dr. Angus of London, and three daughters—Mrs. D. K. McRae of Ekfrid, Mrs. John Shaw of London and Mrs. P. B. Wade of Dorchester.

AUTO AND BUGGY COLLIDE
Both Wrecked, Horse Killed and Young Men Hurt
A collision between a big touring automobile and a buggy on Battle Hill at midnight Thursday resulted in serious injuries to the occupants of the buggy, Clare Trestain and L. D. Siddall, and slight injuries to Arthur Carriere and C. Jones of Windsor, who were in the car. The horse was killed, the buggy wrecked and the car thrown into the ditch with broken wheels, top and windshield. Trestain, who is about 29 years old, hit the point of his shoulder bone broken, and Siddall, also a young man, suffered injuries to the head and face and one knee.

The Windsor men spent the night at W. Henderson's and assumed the damage involved in the killing of the horse and wrecking of the buggy. The buggy was coming east and the car west when they met on the hill. It is believed the pitch of the hill threw the car's lights off the road.

DECLINES TO STOP ACTION

Mr. Justice Latchford, in the weekly court, Toronto, dismissed the motion brought by Clayton B. Sheppard and his wife, Janet Sheppard, of Wardsville, to set aside the action of their daughter-in-law, Muriel Jean Sheppard, against them.

The grounds upon which the dismissal was asked were that in law a wife has no action or right of complaint against persons who, by meddlesome interference and statements against the wife, estrange the husband from the wife.

Mr. Justice Latchford holds that Mrs. Sheppard has a good cause of action against the defendants, if she can make good in evidence the allegations in her statement of claim.

Mrs. Muriel Sheppard in her statement of claim alleges that the defendants made representations to her husband, Wm. H. Sheppard, and in consequence of these he left her. Mrs. Sheppard also claims that the defendants induced her husband to go to Ann Arbor, and gave him money and evidence to assert that he was a resident of that place, so that he could properly apply for a divorce there.
