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Our Sunday Mood What a powerful thing is prejudice. And its twin sister is ignorance. Usually our prejudice against a person is the result of ignorance of his qualities and of the motives which actuate him. We judge without full knowledge and in our discussions are prone to dwell upon the weakness of our fellow-men, rather than their virtue.

It's mighty hard, when you note the narrow-mindedness or the apparent unfairness of this, that or the other person, to believe that he has other redeeming qualities. But after all, there is some good in the worst of us, just as there is some bad in the best of us.

Cast your mind back in recollection of men and events, even if for a few years only, and admit that the quality we lack most is the blessed one of tolerance.

"Sweet Reasonableness" When large numbers of people differ strongly on any question, the truth usually lies somewhere between. Of course no man can be expected to compromise with his principles or his conscience, but it is well to be sure of the motive which guides us before we proceed to extremes, and that it is sometimes wisdom to make haste slowly. If only poor human nature could be satisfied with the use of things, and would refrain from their abuse, there would be no cause for "wets" and "drys". Just how far it is wise to go, in insisting on being our brother's keeper is difficult to say. That we have a duty is certain. Where it begins and ends we are not sure.

However, law is law, and every good citizen should obey it. The rigid enforcement of even a bad law is the surest means to its repeal. But we ought also to be careful not to make unwise laws in the first place.

Talking and Voting It is interesting to note how entirely the Unionist members are under the thumb of the Cabinet. When any of them show signs of independence, the Government points the pistol of a general election at their heads, and the unfortunate fellows promptly throw up their hands. There is nothing they desire less than an election.

Last week a good many Unionists threatened to break away on the Soldiers' Bill which appropriates something like \$40,000,000 for the returned men. Many speakers argued that amounts varying from 100 millions up to the last dollar ought to be paid. Mr. Calder, speaking for the Government, made it plain that unless the original report were adopted, the Government would resign and a general election would follow. That was enough. The bill went through flying and there will be no election for a while.

IN THE DAY'S NEWS

The time-honored Lord Mayor's show will take place in London to-day, and the new Lord Mayor, Sir Edward Ernest Cooper, will be formally installed in office. No more violent contrast is to be found the world over than that existing between the various duties of the Lord Mayor of London. Theoretically, at least, the King of Great Britain and Ireland and Emperor of India cannot enter the city of London without his consent; yet he spends the best part of his mornings dispensing Solomon-

like justice upon petty offenders who have broken the peace of the square mile of territory over which he rules. Outside of this, his duties are largely ornamental. He receives \$50,000 a year, but is expected to spend several times this amount in the way of entertainment and otherwise, keeping up the dignity of his office.

The Northwest Live Stock Show, one of the leading annual exhibitions of pedigreed cattle in the Western States, will get under way to-day at Lewiston, Idaho.

A wonderful substitute for coal, made of a compound of straw, has been discovered by a Spanish engineer. The composition is said to develop sufficient steam for a locomotive in thirty minutes, and the ashes it leaves has been found to make an excellent fertilizer.

Despite the present high prices, King George's tailor bills are probably half of what King Edward's used to be in a year. The late King rarely wore the same suit of clothes more than half a dozen times and often only once or twice, whilst King George usually wears a suit many times before it is removed from the royal wardrobe.

Railway ties used in southern Russia are salted for preservation. The discovery of the efficacy of salt for the purpose was made accidentally some thirty years ago. The telegraph poles of Sebastopol soon rotted below the ground, and one of the workmen tried the experiment of putting a quantity of salt into the hole prepared for the reception of the base of the pole. The wood lasted five times as long as usual, and the experiment was repeated and extended to railway ties.

In factories where needles are made the grindstones throw off great quantities of minute dust particles, although the dust is too fine to be perceptible to the eye. Breathing the dust shows no immediate effect, but gradually sets up irritation, usually ending in pulmonary consumption, and formerly almost all the workmen died before the age of forty. Ineffective attempts were made to screen the air by gauze or linen guards for nose and mouth. At length the use of the magnet was suggested, and now masks of magnetized steel wire are worn by the workmen, and effectively remove the metal dust before the air is breathed.

Two feet is the usual stride of an ostrich, but when the bird is alarmed and begins to run it changes its mincing stride for fourteen-foot steps, which carry it over the ground at a rate of twenty-five miles an hour. At one time snail-racing was a great fad in Austria. Vienna had a fashionable snail-racing club, where fortunes were frequently wagered on the ridiculous contests. Careful records of the time taken by the winning snails to crawl around the miniature race-course were kept, in order that contestants might be properly handicapped in subsequent matches.

LUMP JAW OF CATTLE.

This disease is known by farmers and cattle dealers as "big jaw" and also by veterinarians as "actinomyces." The trouble may occur in other parts of the body, but the jaw is the most often involved with a swelling of more or less size which is the origin of the name so descriptive. About the first thing noticed is a swelling on the face which may come on either lower or upper jaw bone. The owner as a rule feels that the animal has received a blow here, but instead of gradually lessening in size the swelling grows.

Examination shows the swelling to be somewhat painful on pressure and fast to the bone and skin. Later it usually softens near the centre and opens to discharge pus, which is yellowish, thick and sticky in appearance. Often small bright yellow granules and pieces of bone are found in the pus.

It is not uncommon for the root of teeth involved in the swelling to become so disintegrated that they are very sore and prohibit eating, or the teeth may loosen and fall out or at least become so loose as to be moved from their proper position in the jaw.

Cause of Lump Jaw.

A true cause of lump jaw is caused by a fungus that is known as the "actinomyces bovis," or the "ray fungus," because under the microscope they may be seen in large numbers in the discharged pus and appear like stars. The fungus lives upon grasses and hay in a spore stage and is taken in with food. If sores or scratches occur in the mouth it may enter the tissues and begin growing producing as a result the swelling and pus pockets so characteristic of the disease. The reason it is seen so often in the jaw of cattle is no doubt due to the lodgment of the fungus in the jaw at the time teeth are being shed or coming in and also because infected straws often are pushed into the gum at the side of a tooth.

Sometimes enters the tissues of the tongue, too, and growing here produces a thick, hard swelling that is termed "wooden tongue" by farmers. The animal can seldom swallow or eat except with the greatest difficulty when the enlargement reaches its height and it is very serious. Men have become infected with this fungus and one should use care in disinfecting the hands soiled with the pus from such cases. When one remembers that this disease is due to the rapid multiplication of the fungus which causes it, as described in the last article, he will appreciate that early treatment once the diseased spot is located is highly desirable, and should be aimed at destroying the colony of parasites that centres in the swelling.
