The London and
Windsor Schools

Summary Submitted To
Joint Meeting

March 18th 1919.
To the Chairman and Members,
K. & W. Collegiate Board and the
Advisory Committee.

Gentlemen:
On Wednesday of last week, as
per arrangement, the deputa-
tion from the K. & W. Collegiate Board
and Advisory Committee visited the
following schools in London:—The
London Technical and Art School,
The Ryerson Public School, The
Lord Roberts Public School, and
The Riverview Public School.

The party was met on arrival by
Principal Beale and several mem-
bers of the Board, including Messrs.
Barnard, Manning, Strong and Ha-
man, who were indefatigable in
their efforts to make the visit not
only profitable but also one of plea-
sure.

In the evening the party, less two,
left for Windsor, where next morn-
ing a visit was paid to the New
Collegiate Institute. Here, too, Prin-
cipal Gavin and several members
of the Board including Chairman
Guppy, Messrs. Ray, Howe, Bed-
die and others were most kind and
attentive in showing us over the
building and explaining the con-
struction, equipment and details.

In the afternoon two of the party
made a short visit to the Highland
Park High School of Detroit, in-
specting it more particularly as to
its Science and Physical Culture
Departments.

Here follow some notes of fea-
tures likely to be of service to this
locality:

Buildings: The structures most
in evidence are of three stories with
flat roof.

The London Technical covers three
sides of a rectangle with provision
for the erection of an auditorium
and gymnasiums in the centre.

The Windsor Collegiate is that
of the letter "H" in form, with class
rooms in the centre portion and the
assembly hall and gymnasiums at
the ends.

The Ryerson Public School is of
one story only, while The Lord
Roberts and Riverview Public Schools
have the usual three stories. No
addition is contemplated or desired
in the case of these Public Schools.

The Gymnasium of the Windsor
Collegiate is of the standard size
with locker rooms, shower baths
and swimming pool. Here also is
a smaller gymnasium used for the
physical training of the girls, with
its own locker rooms and shower
baths. At certain times the girls
have the use of the large gymnasi-
um.

The Auditorium of the Windsor
Collegiate is fitted with opera chairs
and has a capacity of about 720.
It is arranged that pupils may enter
it for assembly from the first and
second floors. It is designed with
an outside entrance so that it can
be used without opening the re-
mainder of the building.

Some Special Features:—Heating
and Ventilation—Steam coils and
warm-air flues—Temperature au-
tomatically controlled by thermo-
stats. Ventilation—by fan system in
which air is washed and heated to
a fixed temperature.

Lighting—Uni-lateral—extending to
ceiling in London Technical with
steel casements. For Evening—In-
direct lighting throughout.

Lavatory accommodations—by sepa-
rate units on each floor—fixtures
modern.

Master Clock—controls the sig-
nal system for changing classes and
also controls a secondary clock in
each room.

Telephone—a local telephone sys-
tem connects each room with the
office.

Cafeteria—with a lunch room on
each side and a dumb waiter con-
nection with the Household Science
Department.

Library and Reading Room for
use of pupils during spare periods.

Corridors—Floors of re-inforced,
cement—deadens sound. Typ finish
—London Technical, Detroit High
School—6 in. square tiles. Windsor
Collegiate, London Public Schools,
Terrazzo. Width 12 in. London
Technical, 15 in. Windsor, 20 in.
Detroit.

Walls—brick, with vitrified lower
section as a wainscot.

Doors—The upper half of each
door is fitted with a sash having
small panes.

Lockers—In London Technical,
Windsor Collegiate and Detroit High
School the lockers are of metal or
wood and sufficient in number to
allow one for each student, thus
doing away with cloak rooms. The
lockers are inserted flush in walls
of corridors and ventilated.

Tunnels—In the London Techni-
cal the upper portion of the cor-
ridors is tunnelled for the purpose
of carrying mains for water, light,
gas, power etc.

Cleaning—Vacuum system in De-
troit High School. London Tech-
nical prefers dust chutes from each
corridor floor to boiler rooms.

Class and Work Rooms:—In Lon-
don Technical School and Windsor
Collegiate the various rooms, with
respect to their requirements, are
arranged in a very economical form
as well as having ample equipment
and floor space.

In London Technical the Chem-
istry and Physical Laboratories are
in opposite wings—the chemistry
being placed in the girls' wing for
their convenience.

In Windsor Collegiate the La-
boratories for Middle and Upper
School work in Physics, Chemistry
and Biology with Lecture Room
and Stock rooms are arranged most
conveniently on suite. The Lower
School Laboratory for Science and
Geography is situated in the older
part of the building.

In London Technical the ground
floor of the men's wing contains
the metal working equipment, the

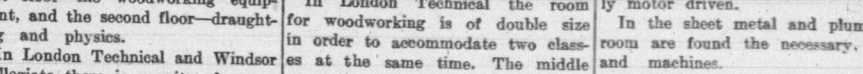

first floor—the woodworking equip-
ment, and the second floor—draught-
ing and physics.
In London Technical and Windsor
Collegiate there is a suite of rooms
in connection with the Household
Science Department to illustrate a
model flat with kitchen, bedroom,
bathroom and living room.
In connection with the Biologi-
cal Laboratories of the Detroit
High School we found a small but
very useful conservatory. We also
noted and were told that class rooms,
and classes are limited to 25 pupils.
In Windsor Collegiate the Com-
mercial Department is en suite and
separated by glass partitions.

In London Technical the room
for woodworking is of double size
in order to accommodate two classes
at the same time. The middle
space being occupied by mill ma-
chinery to be used in common. In
connection with these classes is used
a small lecture or demonstration
room fitted with lecture room chair,
arranged in tiers.
In Windsor this room is equipped
with 24 individual benches and two
long carpenter's benches, also with
8 speed lathes and a bandsaw, all
separately motor driven. An ad-
joining room is equipped with a
surface, a variety saw, a jointer
and a boring machine, all separate-
ly motor driven.
In the sheet metal and plumbing
room are found the necessary tools
and machines.
Equipment Etc. in the London
Technical:—The floors and walls
of the chemistry laboratory and of
the metal working rooms and laun-
dry are similar in finish to the cor-
ridors.
The ceiling of the metal working
rooms has ceiling plates bolted into
the floor above, for attaching hang-
ers etc.
The Household Science table equip-
ment is most serviceable. Gas and
electric stoves for individual use
