

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

ACTION IS APPROVED BY GENERAL STRIKE UNLIKELY

London Feb 5—The best informed opinion to-night is that the menace of a general strike in London is removed. Many conferences were held to-day and the Board of Trade and the Cabinet had another meeting but there has been no marked change in the situation.

Labor Leaders Disapprove.

London Feb 5—The Associated Society of Engineers as evidence of its disapproval of the strikes in London and Ireland and on the Clyde has suspended the functions of its committees in the three areas affected. The secretaries in the districts have been suspended and will not be permitted to hold office in the society for a certain period. This action it is declared is without prejudice to more drastic action being considered by the society.

London Feb 5—In order to prevent strike of power house employees, Order-in-Council was issued to-day under the Defence of the Realm Act making it a summary offence for any person employed by the Government, a municipality or a company which has assumed the duty of supplying electricity, gas or water to break his contract of service or otherwise to strike. The penalty is a six months imprisonment or a fine of \$500 or both.

It is also made an offense to persuade men to break such contracts.

Approved by Public.

The Government's quick action in taking advantage of the King's presence in London to-day to call a meeting of the council to enforce under the Defence of the Realm Act the same legislation to secure the communities an electric supply as already exists to protect in a similar manner the gas and water supplies against strike measures has the full support of the general public and although the Electrical Trade Union at to-night's meeting to consider the situation reached no decision but adjourned till to-morrow, it is believed there will be no electrical workers' strike.

Have no Grievance.

This attempt of the Government to force the Government to act in favor of a 48-hour week by threatening to deprive London of its light and power is almost universally condemned especially as the electricians have no grievances themselves demanding such remedy.

In addition to invoking the Defence of the Realm Act the Government also has taken measures to insure a supply of current in the event that a strike is persisted in and to protect loyal workers. It is understood that Premier Lloyd George now in Paris is being kept informed of all the happenings.
