To-day's trade at the Toronto Cattle Market was characterized throughout by similar conditions and general tone to that of yesterday. The receipts were light and a rather good demand was evident, which condition resulted in bringing out better prices than would have been paid if the feecipts had been larger and the demand less brisk. In some instances the quality of the sales did not warrant the prices paid. The demand for export cattle was strengthened by the early sailing of a vessel, which had not been expected to leave port until a later date, and exporters were obliged to rush shipments. The offerings were fair to good and everything sold out early. The stollar was 47 cars, 392 cattle, 586 sheep, 1,270 hogs and 10 calves.

Export Cattle—The run was light, while the demand was good, and as a consequence everything offered sold readily and at good prices. The general quality was fair, as high as \$5.35 per cwt was paid for extrachoice stock. Prices remain as quoted.

Butchers' Cattle—Receipts were fair but small, and prices remain generally unchanged. A few extra choice cattle were offered, for which figures a little above top quotations were paid.

Milch Cows—The run was not large, but the quality was rather good, and good prices were the rule. One or two extrachoice stock sold as high as \$60.

Sheep and Lambs—The market is generally firm, with lambs strong at an advance to \$60.
