299,600 per year: and eatimating one thonsand of the population of St. Ionis and its precincts (which is about 16,000) to drink one pint per day, it piese an aggregate of 125 gallone: and $1(00)$ to drink one half pint per day, aggregate 63 gallons: and $2: 50$ to drink one gill per day, agpregate is gullons: 3500 to driuk one half gill per day, aggregate it gallons, giving a total amount of 320 gallons per day, and 116.800 gallons of xpirituous ligmore consumed in the city and its precinets per sear. In the estimate it will be percecived that about one half of the population only is supposed to drink spirituous liguors, which it is believed is ? 'ess than the actual proportion; and amount to the sum of 233.600 dollars.

Mr. T. (i. Siette was followed by Maj. Gron. Gaines, of the Enited States army, and the Rev. Mr. Menard. of the Episecopal Church, in support of the resolutions, who were listencid to with great attertion. The Gelleral has been eonnested with the army for more than thirty year, has grown oll in the wervice of his comntry, hern conversant with the crimes of the army, and las attonded persomally to hearing and adjudicating crimes of themselves. Ho stated as a mattir of record that more than nine-tenths of the crimes committed were from the efferets of ardent spirits. 111 or meatly all of the difficulties (said the (ien.) "ith the lodians on our frontiers, the destruction of property, the massacre of defenceless inhabitants, has bern produced by smugeling ardent spirita among the Indians. And İ for one am willing to give my heart, my fiand, and my means in support of the great Temperance reformation.

At an adjourned meeting his honour the Mayor presided, and the sulscription of one thomsand dollars was filled up, and a vote pased to invite Mr. Hunt or Mr. Frost to St. Louis. The following resolutions also were adopted.

On motion of Doctor II. I. Hoffman,
Resolred,- That the use of bars for the sale of spirittuous liquors, on board of stcamboats, are not beneficial to any class of citizens.

On motios, of Col. Chambers,
Resolued,-That the chairman appoint a committee of five to wait on the owners and officers of steaniboats resorting to this city, and confer with them on the subject of discontinuing the sale of ardent spirits on board the boat or hoats in which they have an interest.

On motion of Hamilton R. Camble, Eis!.
Resolred,-That the corporate authorities of the city of St. Louis be requested to employ all the powers conferred by the charter, to diminish the number of shops at which spirits are sold.

Five hundred copies of the Illinois Temperance Herald were ordered for St I.ouis.

## movements in cincrinati.

The friends of Temperance are stirring themselves with great energy and spirit in this city. A strong total abstinence society has been organized, and werkly meetings are held in each of the wards, at which Temperance subjects are discussed, and means devised for the extension of the cause. A bold effort is, also, made to close the coffee houses on the Sabbath. A convention,
from all the wards of the city, has been neld, and a committere appointed to consider and report upon the sulpirct. That committep have reported six spirited resolutions to be laid before the city council.
