Dalhousie Tigers stretched their unbeaten streak to three games after they edged the host U.N.B. Red Devils by a score of 8-6. During the first meeting of the teams, Dal

managed a tie, 5-5.

On Thursday, October 14th. the rookie studded roster locked horns with Coles Harbor Junior Colts. The Junior squad took immediate control of the game and hadn't been for a strong third period, the visiting Dal squad would of faced a humiliating defeat. Fortunately Dal managed to "psyche" up for twenty minutes and ended with a close 8-7 victory.

In the first ever intercollegiate hockey game played in the Aitken, U.N.B. Red Devils managed to salvage a tie with the Tigers, who visited Fredericton to play a two game series with UNB.

Dal's Ray Off opened the scoring on a play from Jack Gray. Mark Sawyer's two goal reply gave the black and red club a short time lead in the opening frame only to see Dal's Paul Delicaet score the tying goal on a play from blue-liner Rick Roemer.

In the second period U.N.B. got goals from Bob Toner and Gerard Chisholm to take the lead but before the end of the second frame, Dal's Grant Pyle scored "a picture goal" from rugged Gerald Dickie and speedster Shawn MacDonald.

In the final frame, Paul Dalicet scored his second goal to even the game but the home towners got a reply from Chisholm, his second of the night to go ahead for the third time. Then, with less than five minutes in the game Shawn MacDonald scored an unassisted goal to give the Tigers a tie.

On Saturday, the two teams went at it again. In the opening frame the Dal squad, fired up from the night before, got goals from Grant Pyle, Jim Bottomley and Earl Theriault to take an impressive 3-0 lead. In the second period, Jack Gray, Bottomley, and Theriault added to the Tigers attack while Jim McInnis and Colin Theriault replied for the Red Devils. The score stood 6-2 after two periods.

In the third stanza, Bottomley scored his third goal while Ray Dunn fired his shot into the net to build on the Tiger lead but UNB came bouncing back. Lack of concentration in the third period coupled with the fact that the Tigers were being outnumbered allowed the Red Devils to score four goals during the twenty minute breakdown. The end result was the Tigers managed an unimpressive 8-6 win to end the weekend.

Dal mentor Pierre Page was quick to mention that "the club has two things to really work at, namely breaking out of our own end as well as working on not being outnumbered", these two points certainly were attributed to the third period let down in the second U.N.B. game but as Page continued "I am pleased thus far with the teams progress. I think Jack Gray is the pivot of our defence to date and that if we get a peak season from Rick Roemer we could become strong defensively." Jack Gray, who scored one goal and assisted on two others attributes his success to "increase in weight together with a weight lifting program which he has been following.

Earl Theriault, who has been showing more signs of team leader-ship feels that the team is more together this year and he suggests that "the new attitude will win more games for us." Coach Page is looking for a more consistant year from Theriault and perhaps the offence could be built from this scoring ace.

It is becoming clearer each day that this squad's fate is yet to be determined and that if consistency becomes a part of the team, it is certainly not unrealistic to expect this young but yet promising club to land a spot in the playoffs.
