Ottawa, April 16, 1917.

Sir.-

In the case of the Indian woman referred to in your letter of the 5th instant, I beg to say that she having married a white man, ceased to be an Indian under the provisions of the Indian Act, and is no longer a ward of the Government. She should, therefore, lay her complaint before a magistrate.
