MESSES. J. STEWART & Co., McNab street, have an old established business, and do a great deal in the manufacture of stoves. The Brian Carpenter stove has recently been patented by them.

D. MOORE & Co., King street, deal in tin and japanned ware, stoves, castings, &c. They employ forty men, and import to the value of \$50,000 per annum. They manufacture all they can, importing only what is indispensible.

MESSRS. L. & P. SAWYER employ twenty-four men in the manufacture of threshing machines, mowers, reapers, fanning mills, ploughs, steves, &c. Value of their manufactures, \$20,000 per annum.

MESSRS. R. JUSON & Co., carry on the manufacture of nails, spikes, and rivets, and employ ten men. They also have a large wholesale hardware establishment.

MESSRS. H. G. COOPER & Co., employ about forty men in the manufacture of carriages, cutters, sleighs, &c. They have one of the most extensive carriage shops in Canada.

MESSRS. MACABE & Co., carriage makers, also do a large business, and have taken the first prize at many of the Provincial shows. They employ good workmen, and have built some of the most handsome carriages in the city.

We may also mention the carriage factories of Mr. J. P. Pronguey and Mr. Enoch H. Tallman.

MESSRS. SHARP & ADDISON, Bay street, deal in lumber, and manufacture doors, sashes, blinds and agricultural implements.

MESSRS. EDGAR & MELVILLE do an extensive business in the manufacture of doors, sashes, blinds, hobs, spokes, felloes, chairs, bedsteads, &c., and also enter extensively into the sale of lumber.

Messrs. Nisber & Co., employ 100, men and women in the manufacture of boots and shoes. They also sell imported goods. Value of their manufacture, \$50,000 per annum.

P. W. Dayfoot carries on a wholesale and retail boot and shoe store, in connection with an extensive tannery in Georgetown.

MESSRS. R. A. PILGRIM & Co., corner Wellington and Henry sts, make soda water, ginger beer, lemonade and other temperance drinks. They supply the whole city, and a large section of the surrounding country.

MESSRS. J. BUNTIN & Co., sell all kinds of printing and wrapping paper and stationery. They supply many of the newspapers in Canada West. Their paper mills are near Montreal, but much of their paper is made by contract.

The city has some elegant public and private buildings, affording conclusive evidence that taste and refinement have not been disregarded in according a due share of importance to commerce and manufactures.
