They appeal to mere conporal feeling, without that mixture of reflection and moral feeling which most other punishment even of a corporal nature, tend to excite. Dr. ing an imprisonment within a room or a hour a boy will probably be led to think; but during a whipping he soldom reflects. Another en attending blows and stripes is, they are apt to discompose the mind of both parent and child unfitting the one from attending to, the other from urging motives and reasons with any propeet of advantage. This is a most important consideration. In proportion as motives of a higher kind can be mixed with those of a love, they tend extremely to qualify the evil which arises from the latter. Greatly, then, ought modes of punishment to be avoided which, while ther press most severely on our animal nature, afford the least room for the influence of higher prisciples.

St. Paul indeed says, "What son is he whom his father chasteneth not"-but chastening may be of various kinds, and may be interpreted for uratively of corrective discipline in general. It is not contended that cornoral punishment should be wholly abolished. Sparingly, it may be em ploved with good effect. The doctrine main tained is, that the subjects of moral education should be governed by the dread of it as lit tle as possible. - Babington's Practical View d Christian Education.
