THE AGRICULTURAL COMMISSION,

OTTAWA, March 30.—A meeting of the committee to inquire into the effect of the tariff upon agricultural interests, was held this morning. Mr. Orton in the chair. Mr. Thomas Dight, a 'prominent miller of Lucan township, was examined. He said he was brought up to the farming business in England, and had farmed in this country for ten years. He found his market for flour principally in the Maritime Provinces. Previous to the imposition of the present duties be used to send the product of his mill to commission merchants in Montreal, and export it to Liverpool. He then sent some flour to the Maritime Provinces, but very little. The capacity of his mill was about a car load a day. His last shipment of flour to Liverpool was 500 sacks, on May 31st, 1881. He tried shipping in bond through the United States to the Maritime Provinces, and a good deal of difficulty was experienced. In consequence of that difficulty he always now shipped direct by the Intercolonial. He read the quotations of wheat in Toronto and London. He accounted for that by the fact that in 1878 millers ground Minnesota wheat and consequently did not buy so much wheat in the market; but since the duty had been put on wheat from the Luited States, millers had to buy their wheat from the farmers. THE HANLAN-BOYD RACE.

THE HAMAN-BOLD RACE.

The Canadian Retains the Championship, Winning the Race by Four Lengths, and Literally Playing with His Opponent.

Newcastle-on-Tyne, April 3.—The long-looked-for and jealously watched race between Edward Hanlan and R. W. Boyd for the sculling championship of England and £1,000 was rowed to-day over the Tyne course from the Mansion House to Scotswood Suspension Bridge, and proved an exceedingly easy victory for the Canadian champion oarsman of the world.

The starting boats were moored opposite the Mansion House, about 100 yards above the high level bridge, and thirty yards apart. The rivals appeared at the starting point within a few minutes of each other, Hanlan using his Phelps & Peters boat and Boyd the Brittania, built by Swaddle & Winship. Boyd dashed away with a start, and was half a length ahead in a few strokes. Hanlan, however, sculling in good form, caught him, and in half a mile he was clear of him. Time to Redheugh Bridge, 3 min. 23 sec. By this time. Hanlan was two lengths in front, and the race was over. The Canadian was in magnificent form, sculling easily and well, pulling not more than twenty-eight strokes to the minute, and winning easily. Boyd was labouring and in evident trouble, pulling a very bad course. Above the bridge it was quite evident that the Canadian could play with Boyd, and soon began his old tricks, playing with his oars, and every now and again stopping dead for several seconds. Boyd struggled gamely on, doing his best, but quite ineffectually. Hanlan stopped, held up his hands, blew his nose and generally disported himself, but directly Boyd got anywhere near him the champion pulled a dozen or more powerful strokes and went right ahead. It was as easy a task for Hanlan as the Laycock race was. The course was splendidly kept, there not being the slightest obstacle in the way. The main feature of the day was the enormous number of spectators, which is estimated at hundreds of thousands, himing the whole course. Hanlan won by four lengths in 21 minutes, six seconds, Hanlan made the first mile in 5.45, the highest booat. A strong tide was running, and the conditions were extremely favorable for the race.
