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BAPTISTS FOR PROHIBITION

Maritime Convention Urges Provincial Government to Grant It

Strong Stand Taken for Moral Reform Movement

Legislation Wanted to Stop Boys Smoking Cigarettes

HALIFAX, Aug. 24.—Temperance and moral reform occupied a considerable portion of the time of the Maritime Baptist convention today. The report of the committee having this subject in charge was presented to the convention and was adopted after considerable debate on the various clauses. The report condemned the existence of the perusal clause in liquor legislation, as by this means liquor could not be thoroughly kept out of the country. Several resolutions were presented to the convention by the committee and were adopted. These were:

Resolved, that in the opinion of this convention the temperance sentiment of our people is overwhelmingly in favor of the total abolition of the liquor traffic and it is the imperative duty of the local legislatures of the Maritime Provinces to give the largest measure of prohibition to such traffic that is within their power, and to cooperate with efficient government enforcement.

Resolved, that this convention is deeply impressed with the absolute necessity for carrying the principles of temperance and moral reform into effect as firmly as possible, and of applying them undeviatingly and impartially to the conduct of municipal, provincial and Dominion affairs. That it is a practical negation of these principles and contrary to the teachings of this convention to support, vote for or endorse any candidate for public position whose acts counter thereto.

Resolved, that this convention welcome and commend all efforts being made privately and by governments for the suppression of the infamous white slave traffic, and stands as a foul blot on Christian civilization, and pledges its support in all possible ways for the suppression of the same.

Resolved, that this convention support the widening and increasing use of our land, and the suppression thereof by force of simple, influence and teaching of family, church and schools, and such reasonable preventative legislation as can be secured.

Fifty thousand dollars is the sum set by the committee to be raised for various purposes during the coming year. Of this amount thirty thousand dollars is apportioned to Nova Scotia, eighteen thousand five hundred to New Brunswick, and five hundred to Prince Edward Island.

Resolved, that in the event of such a union it is the opinion of this joint committee that the membership of the home mission board should be composed of representatives from each of the constituencies of the present existing boards, and that it should be located at some central place that may be mutually satisfactory, and further:

Resolved, that the above should form the report of this joint committee to the New Brunswick Association and to the Maritime convention.

QUEENS COUNTY COAL AREAS ATTRACT C. P. R.

Company May Purchase as Result of Strikes—Officials on the Spot

The story that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company is negotiating for the purchase of coal areas in the Maritime Provinces has been revived. The strikes at Springhill and in Cape Breton are said to be the cause of the C. P. R. turning its attention to coal mines. It is said that the company has had officials looking over not only the Nova Scotia areas but also those near Grand Lake in this province.

A couple of years ago the report that the Canadian Pacific had interested itself in Maritime Provinces coal areas was current. At that time officials of the railway visited this section of Canada and made an examination of the coal areas including those near Grand Lake. At the present time the name of H. P. Finerman is mentioned in connection with the rumour that the C. P. R. is about to acquire coal lands in the Maritime Provinces.

Col. H. H. McLean, M. P., local solicitor for the Canadian Pacific Railway, when asked by "The Sun" last evening of the company was negotiating for coal lands, said that when the C. P. R. went about buying any property the purchase was not made to the accompaniment of a brass band. He had heard nothing of rumored purchase of coal bearing lands, but had heard that Mr. Finerman, accompanied by A. R. Shipp, M. P. F., had gone to the Grand Lake region. There had been numerous stories, continued Col. McLean, to the effect that the C. P. R. would buy and operate its own coal mines in the Maritime Provinces. Nothing had come of them, however.

LOOKING FOR SITE FOR SANITARIUM

Special Committee Will Report to Commission Tomorrow.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Aug. 25.—Dr. McAvaney, of St. John, and Dr. Botsford, of Moncton, were at the Barker House last night and have about completed their tour of the Province in search of the best site for a tubercular sanitarium. They form the special committee from the tubercular commission appointed by the provincial government and will report at a meeting of the commission to be held here on Thursday evening.

F., they inspected the site at Walford offered by him and later drove through the district between Walford and Fredericton Junction, where they found a site even better adapted than that at Walford. They here inspect a site proposed by Dr. B. W. Robertson, of that place, who is a member of the commission, returning here to report to the meeting of the commissioners on Thursday evening.
