Hearst when it was referred to him. As a result of fact, the Prime Minister pointed out that the Government has no authority to take any such action.

The only means by which the hours of sale may be shortened is by legislation either shortening them or giving the government power to do so. Since no such legislation can be made effective until well into spring, the "winter war measure" would not accomplish much.

PARIS, Oct. 30.—A chateau near Brest, belonging to the Princess Hohenlohe, has been ordered seized by the court. It is estimated that the property of 30,000 firms and 100,000 private individuals of German and Austrian nationality will be sequestered in pursuance of government decree.
