FRENCH ENERGY FOR WAR.

No Time to Be Concerned With Mere Industrial Progress.

The important effect on French trade after the war of the new chemical, metallurgical and mechanical industries created in answer to the needs of the army, are emphasized by Albert Thomas, Under-Secretary of War, at a luncheon of the Economic and Financial Association.

"Our war loans of to-day is not only the loan of a victor, but incorporated as it is in all our new creations, it becomes in some ways a great industrial revolution which will permit us to prepare fruitful enterprises for the peace of to-morrow," he said.

"We shall have made new and fecund creations, and the national savings, almost entirely locked up hitherto in Government securities, will flow into channels where they will be the driving force of an industry of to-morrow. Attempts are being made to revive old industries, to create new ones, and direct new French forces to the conquest of 'new markets' today, in order to give a word of warning. Let us associate our pre-occupations with the war with the development of to-day, but let us be sure that no force shall be diverted from the essential task of to-day and from the France of the war."

"We are determined upon America," he went on, "for parts of our steel and shells. Recently there have been torpedoing, and ships laden with shells have been sunk. If these incidents become more frequent and deliveries of American metal become rarer, what would our situation be? Our steel industry is not perhaps so assured the entire production of the raw materials that we may conceive will be wanted to carry out our programme of armaments, but to diminish gradually the gap between our resources and our wants."

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.
EVERY sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may be considered a tenant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Distric—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead claim; also 30 acres extra cultivation.
