WILL HAVE A TOWN HALL. BELMONT AND METHUEN.

BY-LAW FOR THE ERECTION OF HALL AND LOCK-UP CARRIED BY A MAJORITY OF THIRTY.

The voting on the Town Hall and Lock-up By-law on Monday resulted in the by-law being carried by a majority of 30, 57 votes for and 27 against.

The result proves that our citizens desire to show their faith in our enterprising town and also wish to have substantial public buildings for the increasing needs and amusements which are accruing daily.

Havelock can now boast of having as good or better streets and sidewalks as any place of its size in Ontario, while it is yet in its infancy. Our public school is a first class edifice and the new building about to be erected will also be up-to-date in every particular. No doubt a few years will see electric lights and efficient fire protection, if our present good times continue and a wise and painstaking council are elected to look after the welfare of our town.

The war in South Africa has caused several publishers to advertise forthcoming histories of that country. We have several of the prospectus books before us. One is from the pen of a newspaper correspondent who was in South Africa a short time ago, but is not there at all now. Another is a rehash of Livingstone's and Stanley's travels, with a few engravings and pages added.
