### GOVERNOR OF JERUSALEM.

Nova Scotians can place  
themselves at the front where-  
ver found. It has been offi-  
cially announced that Mr. Ro-  
land Storrs, C. M. G., has been  
appointed Governor of Jerusa-  
lem, with the rank of tempo-  
rary Lieut. Col. Mr. Storrs en-  
tered the Egyptian Civil Service  
in 1904, and was appointed act-  
ing Oriental Secretary of the  
British Agency, Cairo, in 1906.  
He is a son of the Very Rev.  
John Storrs, Dean of Rochester,  
who is a Nova Scotian, and  
spent part of the summer of  
1910 here, and is a Nephew of  
Mr. Robert Storrs of Wolfville.  
His grandfather was for many  
years Rector of Cornwallis.

Currie, Missionary to the Tele-

The deceased was a member  
of Immanuel Baptist church  
and enjoyed a wide circle of  
friends.

72nd. Highlanders' Man Re-  
turned Home.—Angus P. Horne,  
son of Andrew P. Horne, En-  
field, this County, arrived at  
Halifax last week after three  
years of active service at the  
front. He had been wounded  
and was in Hospitals and is  
now back home. When the  
war broke out in 1914, he en-  
listed with the 72nd Highland-  
ers in British Columbia, where  
he resided, and went overseas  
with the first Contingent. On  
his way West he was given  
leave to visit his parents at  
Enfield. Mr. Horne is six  
feet tall, and a splendid speci-  
men of a Canadian soldier. He  
had a brother Bennett, killed in  
action over a year ago and has  
another brother Gerald, who  
went overseas in the 112th
