He was a typhoid patient in the General Hospital for nearly three months at the latter part of last year and has not since been thoroughly well. He went out on Saturday night and on his return at 11.40 complained of pelns in his stomach. He went to bed and when his mother went in to awaken him at about 9.30 yesterday morning, he was unconscious.

Dr. J. C. Ray and Dr. H. McFaul were immediately summoned and ound that Sedgwick showed symptoms of morphine poisoning. After working upon him for some time the medical men decided that it was best that he should be removed to the General Hos-Beside the bed in which stage as found. It came from the Osgoode Pharmacy and had contained eight powders. Part of the ingredients of the powders was morphine, one quarter of a grain of which was in each powderin all two grains. Whether deceased had/taken all of the powders is not known.

HAS SLEPT SINCE FEBRUARY.

The Strange Case of a Twenty-Year-Old Chicago, May 10.—The case of Anna Hughes has attracted the attention of physicians here, and is a matter of considerable interest among them. Since February last the girl, who is 20 years of age, has spent most of her time sleeping, scarcely taking time to eat her mosts.—Her mother was worrled over her daughter's condition, and the neighbors all declared she should be placed under treatment. She was, accordingly, taken to the County Hospital, where physicians, after examining her, pronounced her all right. But as her drowsiness continued it was finally believed she was insane, and she was taken to the detention hospital. The young woman appeared intelligent enough, but complained of wanting to sleep. She said she could go to sleep in a minute if allowed to lie down. One of her arms appeared to be partly paralyzed, but otherwise her physical condition seemed normal. Dr. Waters was much puzzled about the case, declaring some physical aliment must be responsible for the girl's condition.

Will Make Tremble With Spain.

Washington, May 9.—The passage of the death sentence on the men caught on the filibuster Competitor, it is stated, is liable to bring about a crisis in the relations between Spain and the United States. It is understood that this Government will not allow the executions to take place without an earnest and vigorous protest against the summary manner in which the trial was conducted. Of the five men convicted and sentenced, two are native born American citizens, and a third, William Kinlea, described as an Englishman. He is understood to be a naturalized citizen of this country.
