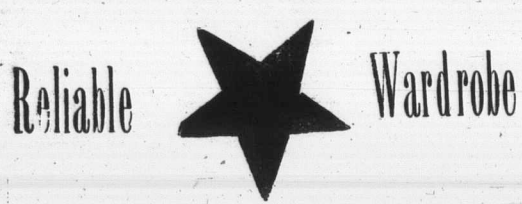

KILLED THEMSELVES.

A Couple of Sunday Tragedies
in Toronto.

O. F. Botsford, a Queen Street Chemist,
Found at the Foot of Leslie Street, with
a Bullet Wound in the Head—The Body
was in Watchman Hill's Boat, Moored
Near the Patent Factory.

Toronto, May 11.
The body of O. F. Botsford, druggist,
1094 Queen-street west, is lying in the
Morgue with a bullet wound in the
head, the effects of a revolver fired
by himself.

On Friday night the deceased attended
a social gathering in the west end,
and acted so strangely as to draw con-
siderable attention to himself. Since
then little was seen of him until yester-
day morning, when J. H. Hill, of
watchman at the Canada Hotel, wander-
ing around. About 3.30 in the afternoon,
when Hill went down to use his boat,
which he keeps moored near the hotel,
he found the body of a man lying in
the bottom of the boat, with the
head resting on the seat, and a revolver
lying on the floor in the right hand. The
bullet had entered the head just above
the right ear and come out at the left
side.

The deceased was added to the use
of cocaine, and for some time kept
a loaded revolver in the store, much
to the discomfort of his clerks and cus-
tomers.

Botsford was a nephew of C. S.
Botsford, the dry goods man, and has
a brother, N. F., who is a trader.
Botsford leaves two sisters,
wife and child.

Funeral services will be held on
Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

A CONDUCTOR'S DEATH

From Too Big a Dose of Morphine Admin-
istered by Himself.

Toronto, May 11.
John W. Sedgwick, a conductor em-
ployed by the Street Railway Com-
pany, and residing at 2 Spadina-avenue,
shortly before noon yesterday as a re-
sult of an overdose of medicine admin-
istered by himself. Deceased was 25
years of age and has not been enjoying
good health lately. He was a typhoid
patient in the General Hospital for
last year and has not since been
thoroughly well. He went out on Sat-
urday for some time, and on Sunday
complained of pains in his stomach.
He was taken to the General Hospi-
tal in the afternoon, and died at 3
yesterday morning, he was uncon-
scious.

Dr. J. C. Hay and Dr. H. McCall
were called to the house, and found
that Sedgwick showed symptoms
of morphine poisoning. After working
upon him for some time, the medicine
was decided to be that he should be
removed to the General Hospital.

Beside the bed in which Sedgwick
lay, an empty drug bottle was found.
It came from the Osgoode Phar-
macy and had contained several bottles.
Part of the ingredients of the
powder was morphine, one quarter
of which was in each powder-
in all two grains. Whether deceased
took all of the powder is not
known.

R. F. Sedgwick, a brother, who is
a conductor on the T. & E.R. accom-
panied him in the police ambulance to
the hospital, but notwithstanding the
strenuous efforts of the hospital doc-
tors the unfortunate died without an
operation being admitted to the
institution.

STABBED TO THE HEART.

Jacob Hill, a Great Indian, Near Cathcart,
Instantly Killed His Non-Indian
Stepson.

Brantford, May 10.—Jacob Hill, an
Indian living in the neighborhood of
Cathcart, while quarrelling with his
stepson, Abraham Clava, a boy,
aged here, who was armed with a
knife, stabbed him in the heart, killing
him instantly. Hill is now in jail in
Brantford.

well developed and able to cry lustily.
The mother is doing well.

RUSSIA HAS NERVE.

The British Minister has protested

Russian warships are off Chefoo land-
ing apparatus to support the consul.

Murder and Cannibalism.
San Francisco, May 10.—The steamer
Manowah brings news of the wholesale
murder of traders and missionaries
by natives of the islands of Manning
Strait and the Solomon Malay
savages butchered a whole boat crew
of men from the brig Rio Logo at
Lahuan, two French and one Ameri-
can traders being slaughtered. The
missioner on the island had been at-
tacked and the missionaries escaped
with difficulty, going back to Sydney
and his American assistant and eight
peaceful natives were lured ashore and
killed. The bodies were also murdered.
The mission on Tounan Island has been
attacked and the result of the atroc-
ity of the natives.
